Dear parents and carers,

From Monday 8th June, school will be open further to accommodate children in Nursery, FS2, Year 1 & Year 6 only, whilst also continuing to provide childcare for the children of keyworkers. Although this is later than the planned 1st June, <u>all arrangements for further opening remain the same</u> as previously sent out via Parent Mail and the handbook for parents and carers that summarises how the new systems will work. Please take the time to read through this again and discuss it with your child to help them prepare for the routines in place in school

If we are welcoming your child back to school on Monday, please ensure that you stick closely to your <u>allocated times for drop off and pick up so that the number of pupils and adults at our school gates is</u> <u>limited and we can safely socially distance.</u>

Children who remain at home will receive new codes for Seesaw and messages to explain the new arrangements. There are now three online classes called Bevan, Nightingale and Jenner that have been set up ready to begin learning on Monday 8th June. <u>It is really important that your child accesses Seesaw every day</u> and submits activities so that they can engage with teachers here and keep to a routine. Our teachers will be using Seesaw to support your child with their work and their wellbeing so engagement is key! 
We also thought about friends and how we can sometimes need to say sorry to them and show them we are sorry by doing something kind for them.

Star of the week: Poppy R






Debussy


In Maths, they have been using Oak Academy to learn about number and addition and subtraction as well as having a go at some brain busters!

Williams




Rose chose a fridge

They have also been completing SPaG work, using the suffixes -ous and -sion – Lexi created a very useful poster for everyone:








Puccini
