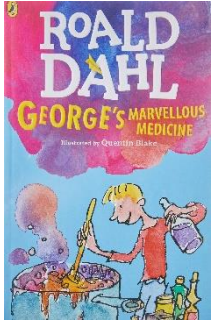
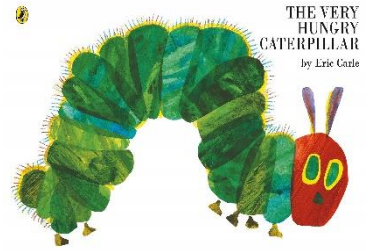
Recycling

Virtual learning:

Handel & Holst - Mrs Dean and Mrs Turton are delighted that the Nursery and Reception Seesaw classes are up and running successfully. All the staff, staff pets and Bonkers are loving seeing and hearing what the children have been getting up to. The children have been doing lots of activities around The Very Hungry Caterpillar- they have made caterpillar and butterfly pictures, counted the things that the caterpillar ate and moved like a caterpillar and a butterfly. If your child hasn't been part of Seesaw yet then do come and join the fun!

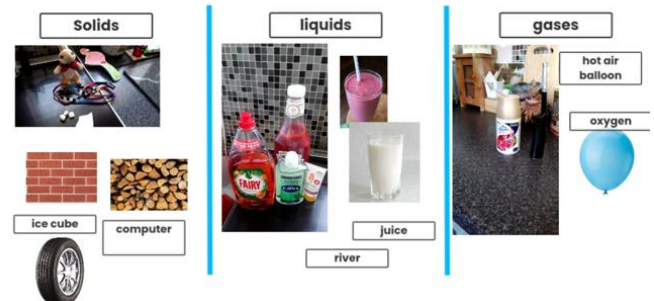
Tchaikovsky children have been very busy learning about light and dark in their Clarborough Curriculum. They went around their homes to look for opaque, transparent and reflective objects. They also celebrated St. George's day yesterday by finding facts out about him and designing a St. George's day t-shirt.

In Maths they recapped finding fractions equivalent to a whole number and then they found fractions of an amount...this really stretched their brains using their multiplication and division skills, well done year 3! In English they watched a short film which had no speaking in and used their inference skills to describe the characters feelings.

Williams have submitted lots of work set by Miss Marshall and Mrs Garton. This has included:

- Looking at solids, liquids and gases in science and taking photos of items around their house that they can categorise;
- Completing some great pieces of writing and maths work;
- Accessing Charanga for the first time and listening to music by the Beatles;
- Completing arts and crafts submissions

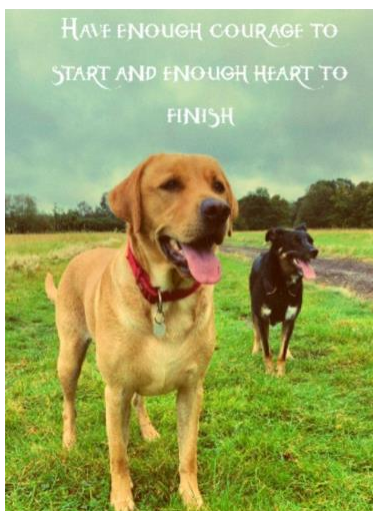
Remember Year 4 – keep practising those times tables on TT Rockstars!

- Completed science experiments, creating super designs such as the tallest towers and floating devices;
- Completed a BBC teamwork activity, recognising and appreciating all of their qualities that makes them unique and a great team player;
- Looked at some tricky maths including revisiting work on negative numbers and super maths challenges;

It has been absolutely fabulous to watch them in their videos and also listening to their reading via audio recordings – it's really pleasing to see how engaged they all are!



Puccini have started the first week back with a great attitude with lots of children interacting with Seesaw. Mr Byrom is really impressed with their resilient approach to learning and wants you all to keep up the hard work!

In Maths the children have been continuing their learning and understanding about angles. Exploring angles in a different triangles and calculating missing angles.

English has seen the children learning about St George for their reading comprehension and are keeping on top of their SPaG knowledge by completing SPaG Spotters.

Computing has involved editing photos. The children learnt how to screen shot, import the photo and then edit it by adjusting the effects and even some added text. An example is to the right.
