It has been a fun-filled week in Nursery this week, with lots going on! We are really proud of the way in which the children have coped with even more changes and they


have shown such great resilience.

Maths


In Maths, the children have been finding missing numbers in number sentences as well as learning about fact families; understanding the addition and subtraction number sentences you can make with set numbers.

English

Last week, we completed our stories based on 'The Queen's Hat'. They were so proud of the story books they created and were so happy to take them home to share with you!

This week, the children have been learning about poetry. They planned and wrote their own rain poem as well as exploring rain sounds by making their own rain stick.





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Topic

The children have yet again immersed themselves in their Topic work this half term. They have found out about a range of British Monarchs from William the Conqueror to Queen Elizabeth II. They have enjoyed learning about Henry VIII this week!



Safer Internet Day

On Tuesday, the children completed a range of activities for 'Safer Internet Day'. They listened to a story about a dog called Buddy who taught them how to stay safe online and to always talk to a trusted grown up if they are unsure of anything.

There will be no spellings to learn over the half term break. Children will bring home a list of words to practise reading.

Year 2 (L.S. Lowry)




In Year 2 this week, we have been talking about how to stay safe on the internet. We started by asking some simple questions:

- -who do you think owns the internet?
- -who do you think decides what can be put on to it?
- -who makes sure the things on the internet are truthful and real?

We had some interesting answers ranging from the Government, Google to our parents. Some were shocked to find out anyone could add things to the internet and this sparked discussions about how safe and reliable things

actually were on the internet. We talked about how we can stay safe in the internet and how we can be 'SMART'. The children then designed some posters about how we can stay safe and an information leaflet about being SMART.







In Maths we have been learning to divide by 5's and 10's to follow on from dividing by 2 from last week. The children have been using their counting in 2's, 5's and 10's knowledge to support them in this and learning that addition and subtraction are the inverse of each other, multiplication and division are also inverse operations.

Also, the children learnt that 1/2 and 2/4 are equivalent fractions. They recapped their learning on fractions and used the skills they had learnt to find 1/2, 1/4, 1/3, 3/4 and 2/4 of a shape and quantity. After half term the children will start a new Maths topic of shape with Mrs Green.



Our PSHE topic on 'One World' was concluded this week by learning how we can all help to look after our world and be planet protectors. We began by sharing what the children loved about our world and then shared ideas on how we could help. The children came up with many ideas such as turning lights and other electrical items off when not being used and not dropping litter to protect the environment and animals.

The children have worked well this term in PE exploring balances and travelling in gymnastics. They thoroughly enjoyed putting all they had learnt and explored together into a sequence this week and using the benches as well as mats to travel along in different ways.



The children have continued to use junior infant tools in Computing. This week they created a pie chart, bar chart and block chart to show the class's favourite sport.

In Rainbow Grammar, the children have learnt to use numerical determiners to describe the number of a noun. We discussed that larger numbers are not often used in stories and instead we say 'lots of' or 'hundreds of'. The children enjoyed making up their own funny sentences using numerical determiners.

We hope you all have a lovely half term and will see you all back on Monday 21st February!

Year 3 (William Morris)





This week the children have been very creative and challenged themselves. We started the week with our 'Show me what you know' end of topic assessment. The children had to show all they had learnt about the rainforest. Even the children learning from home produced work to a very high standard, showing great knowledge and understanding of this topic

In Maths, the children have been learning how to read a calendar and solving problems involving time and in Music we appraised different genres of music.


In Science we have been learning about the human skeleton and carried out an investigation to see if the length of the femur had a bearing on the distance a person can jump. The children really enjoyed the investigation and decided on the measures to put in place to ensure it was a fair test.


In English we created a non-chronological report. The children looked at the layout and features of an example so they knew what to include in their own. They planned headings to use in their writing, then using their English and Topic books, started to put their information together. The children used Word on the computer and it was quite challenging at first, but they didn't give up and, in the end, produced some great work and information all about the rainforest. They then collated the information in their books and created a beautiful piece of work as you can see!
















The children took part in a DT day on Friday, where they designed, created and evaluated their balloon car. The children learnt about axles and the importance of these for vehicles to work. The children designed and labelled their balloon cars and then created them using a step by step process. They all helped each other and they were very careful with all the equipment. Year 4 (Salvador Dali)



This week in Maths the children have been learning how to find the area of both compound and non-compound shapes as well as making comparisons between the largest and smallest areas. In English, the children have been writing instructions on how to be a Roman soldier using time adverbials and imperative verbs.

In Topic, the children have been exploring Roman architecture and the influence it had on Britain. They have learnt all about the Roman roads, including locations, recognising Roman places 'cester' 'caster' 'caister' as well as looking at the different materials the Romans used to build their roads. The children also found out about aqueducts, amphitheatres and villas.

On Tuesday the children took part in 'Safer Internet Day'. They found out about their digital footprints. They looked at which apps they currently use and explored how the information we share online stays there forever. They also found out that some famous people made mistakes online when they were younger and it has now ruined their careers, meaning they must be careful online and not share any personal information or demonstrate any unkind behaviour including bullying, racism, sexism or being homophobic. The children then researched the legal ages to be able to access and use the apps that most of them use at home. Everyone was most shocked with WhatsApp being 16+ years old!





On Friday morning the children who have completed their 3 reads at home each week received their Italian morning. They enjoyed both sweet and savoury pizzas - they were delicious! A huge well done to; Toby, Winnie, Adam, Nathan, Beatrice, Stanley, Reece and Bobby-Lee for ensuring they have read at home at least 3 times every week.






Year 5 (Banksy)



In Maths this week, we have continued to practise our formal methods of multiplication and division. We have also been using some practical resources to solve some rather tricky problems!








In French, we have learnt how to write sentences about pets — I have been really impressed with how confident the children have been able

Year 6 (Lucian Freud)


This week, the class have worked fantastically hard.

In English, the children have started writing their narratives based upon the book 'Stone Age Boy'. The stories that I read were filled with the most amazing detail and description from learning to knap rocks, prepare animal skins to making clothes and tents and even learning to use a spear to hunt animals and provide for the tribe.

In Maths, we have looked at understanding how to solve reasoning style questions. We looked at two-step area and perimeter problems and questions all based upon the different parts of a circle. In Topic, we entered the Bronze Age and compared it to the Stone Age. We looked at everything from housing, burials and even looked at the life of a high-born Stone Age woman and how the artefacts found in her grave could tell us about her life and the life of her people.

In Science, we looked at microorganisms. We compared fungi, bacteria and viruses and how they are different from each other and how they interact with the human body. To demonstrate this, we started a mould experiment and put bread into different environments and tried to determine which one might be more likely to grow mould on it.

Finally, in Art, we finished off our Stone Age necklaces as you can see below. After this, we tried to create our own modern versions of the Stone Age hand print art. We combined this with the idea of creating an optical illusion drawing which you can also see below.
