

Reception (Georgia O'Keeffe)




This week Reception have been listening to the story of 'The Gruffalo' and have made their own amazing Gruffalo models.

Year 1 (Joan Miro)



Maths

In Maths this week the children compared sets of numbers and were able to use the correct symbols for 'more than', 'less than' and 'equal to'. They used ordinal numbers to describe positions in a race.

Next week, they will look at recognising and naming a range of 2D and 3D shapes.

English

This week the children completed speech bubbles for the characters from 'The Three Little Pigs' and wrote some fantastic sentences to describe the pigs. The children are beginning to self-assess their writing to check they have used a capital letter at the beginning, included finger spaces and a full stop. Using a purple pen, they went back to make any improvements.

Next week, we will work together to write a letter to Mother Pig and choose a different character to replace the wolf.



Topic

This week the children found out about Florence's later life and explored her later years. We looked at the work she did when she returned to England and how she improved nursing.

Next week, the children will identify similarities and differences between medical care now and in Victorian times, including what nurses wear as well as hospital wards, using pictures as prompts. They will also think about how treatments were different and will have the opportunity to find out some First Aid rules! In 1908, she was also awarded the Honorary Freedom of the City of London. This honour consisted of a special ceremony to reward her for her services to nursing.






Art and Design

This week the children talked about what it means to belong to a team. They drew and labelled a team they belong to and wrote a sentence to say what this means to them.






Year 2 (L.S. Lowry)




This week Year 2 have worked incredibly hard, they have shown great dedication and resilience, and are proving how independent they can be.

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In Maths this week, the children have continued to work on their money skills and finding the correct amount from a choice of coins, and matching the same amount. The children are becoming more and more confident with their coin knowledge and this is really helping them with their work. They have also been working on their place value work, using place value charts. Following on from this they have also compared various objects using more than, less than or the equal sign. Great work Year 2 keep it up! In Science, the children have been identifying and grouping different everyday items and recording these into their books. The children had to identify the material and then find where we use this material at home and at school. They all did really well with this task and had great discussions about other materials they know and their uses.

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Star of the week: Isabella for always working so very hard, being on task and being an absolute super star!


Year 3 (William Morris)



English


This week the children have enjoyed learning about King Midas and they all agreed that he was not a very sensible or clever man. We have had fun exploring adjectives to describe him

and finding words that make our writing more exciting e.g. narcissistic, egocentric and mercenary plus lots of others. We look forward to sharing our writing with you when it is finished.



The children are also writing a conversation between King Midas and his daughter after he had turned her to gold. I know there will be some interesting work because they had super ideas about this in class!

Next week, we will be investigating alternative and different words to use in our writing instead of the word 'said' – perhaps you could investigate this with your child over the weekend!



Maths

The children have been drawing and labelling their own number lines this week. It has been challenging but the children from William Morris class have worked hard, not become dispirited and learned how important it is to be resilient and to keep trying! They are now producing some fantastic number lines that support their Maths and are feeling proud of their achievement. Well done to everyone!

Morris class have also been learning to compare lengths. They have had to think really carefully and use their previous learning on equivalent lengths to compare lengths in cm, mm and m. Next week, the children will be adding and subtracting lengths.

In Science, the children have really enjoyed investigating which rocks are permeable and impermeable. Next week, they will be learning how fossils are formed.

As part of their learning about Ancient Greece children found out about the alphabet and were surprised to discover the letters were different to those in our own alphabet. They practised forming the letters and are going to make alphabet scrolls next week. It was interesting finding out about education in Ancient times. They all liked the idea of a "Pedagogue" who would carry their books, lunch and help with homework.









During their Art lesson Year 3 have been colour mixing and discovering where the colours are on the colour wheel. They are always so enthusiastic in Art and have produced some excellent work!

Next week, we will be continuing with addition and subtraction in Maths and thinking how this can be applied to word problems. In English, the focus will be on descriptive writing and writing a conversation using inverted commas. In Art we will try to create stone tablets with the Greek Alphabet.

Year 4 (Salvador Dali)



In English, the children have started writing their letters from Lila to her father. The children have worked really hard on their draft plans and next week they will be editing these using their new skills; prepositional phrases demonstrating where and when.

In Maths, Year 4 were super stars this week learning all about negative numbers and remembering zero is a number! We have begun recapping basic subtraction methods too. Although the children can remember

how to use column subtraction methods their mental recall of subtraction facts isn't secure. This is something we are now working on. To help at home they could recap their number bonds to 10, ensuring they respond quickly without counting on their fingers.

In Science, the children created their own classification keys and next week they will be using all of their information so far to collate in to their mini-beast handbooks.

In Topic, they have really enjoyed learning about the oracle bones. They discovered that the bones weren't actually real 'dragon bones' but were the shoulder blades of cattle and they were inscribed with Chinese writings. We had lots of fun and they also set me challenges to decode in their books! Next week, they will be exploring different artefacts and their significance.



In French, they now know how to ask 'how old are you?' They

included this within their speaking exercise which has been uploaded to their Seesaw accounts. Next week, they will be learning how to ask 'where do you live?'

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In Music, Year 4 are thoroughly enjoying Mamma Mia! So far they have listened to and appraised the music, researched ABBA and felt the pulse and beat to the music. We have started to learn the lyrics and next week will be focusing on tone and pitch.

Year 5 (Banksy)



What a productive week we have had in Banksy Class! As usual, the children are working extremely hard to be the best they can be!

English: This week the children have been planning a piece of writing based on their work in RE. They have been comparing the lives of William Booth, founder of The Salvation Army and Marcus Rashford, England footballer and campaigner for free school meals. Next week, they will complete and publish their work.

Maths: The children have enjoyed learning about negative numbers (with a Tug of War game) and revising their knowledge of Roman Numerals. They have also learned how to translate a shape using directions. Next week, they will be adding two four-digit numbers and solving problems relating to them. They will also learn to translate shapes using coordinates.

History: This week Year 5 have learned about many of the crimes committed by poor Tudors and the horrendous punishments imposed on them. Next week, they will find out about diseases in Tudor Britain and how these diseases were treated.

Geography: This week the children learned to read and use six-figure grid references and this will continue next week.

PSHE: This week the children learned about the attributes that make a good team and they identified many positive attributes in teams they admire. Have a look at their work on Seesaw. Next week, they will learn how to be respectful of other people's opinions.

French: This week Year 5 learned how to say the date in French, 'Aujourd'hui c'est la trente Septembre' and next week, they will focus their listening skills to test their knowledge of dates.

Art & Design: This week they completed their clay Tudor Roses by painting them used the red of Lancaster and the white of York. Next week, they will practise their sketching skills.

Year 6 (Lucian Freud)

English - This week Year 6 have been using their knowledge of World War II to finish their newspaper articles and to begin to write a diary entry from the perspective of an evacuee. We have discussed what it must have felt like to leave all your family and everything you know with a move from the city to the countryside to live with strangers!


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Maths - The children have been applying their knowledge of the four operations of addition, subtraction, multiplication and division to carry out word problems. Year 6 have been excellent at working out which important mathematical information they need from the question to work out the answers.

Topic - We continue to build on our knowledge of the events of World War II and have been learning all about the life of an evacuee with the help of the novel 'My War Diary' by Marcia Williams. The children wrote a letter to their family left behind filling it with details of the highs and lows of life as an evacuee.



RE - The theme of World War II continues in RE and this week Year 6 have been discussing life for Jewish people leading up to and during the war and how they were persecuted.

Art- The work of artist and sculptor Henry Moore has been the focus for art this week. We have been focusing on the drawings he made of people sheltering down in the London Underground during the Blitz. The children's pictures are looking stunning so far and we will show you the finished results next week.
