## **Home Learning and Purple Mash**

For home learning, many tasks will be set using a range of different resources. These include: BBC Bitesize, White Rose Maths sheets, ilearn2, Digimaps, Oak Academy, Charanga, TT Rockstars, Purple Mash, Science experiments and more. You are all doing a fantastic job at completing the work set, so thank you for this!

Most of you have accessed Purple Mash this week and have shared your views on how much you've enjoyed this (even if we did have a few hiccups with the log-ins!). We're so proud of your progress and how you're rising to the challenge of using technology to complete the work.

When accessing Purple Mash, please ensure that when you click the exit button, you click the <u>'save and exit'</u> option as this saves the work.

This response work does not always appear in your own work folder but appears in the 2Do folder under the task by clicking 'open work' and this is also on the teacher's account. So do not panic - all the work gets saved! You could also take a photo before saving, just as you would with a paper copy of your work.

When you play on the Maths games, this score is recorded automatically and ready for the teachers to see.

We know that some of you have struggled to access the work after school hours as there was a time restriction, so we have now extended the hours so you can access the work at your own leisure, beyond 3.30pm, if that suits your situation better at home.




On Wednesday afternoon the children enjoyed playing outside on the roller boards.




Thursday afternoon was even more exciting when the children took part in the cup stacking challenge.



The vegetables planted during lockdown by the key worker children are growing really well and this week we have been able to start harvesting the lettuces...yum!




## **Class 1 Bubble Group**

In the Class 1 bubble group, the children have had another fantastic week at school!





In Maths this week, Year 6 have been investigating nets.


We recapped the properties of 2D and 3D shapes and then using Polydron the children had a go at making some simple shapes.






After this, we then transferred our knowledge into making a net for a cuboid for a 'special box'.

We have had a very busy week in Nightingale class looking specifically at the work of the post office and postal workers. Letters have been buzzing between the school and online classes!






In Science, they have been challenged to make eggshell geode crystals with some amazing results!






They have also had a fun quiz to guess the titles of some popular children's books.
