#### Valentine's Disco

#### **Nursery and 30hrs: Percy Shaw Class**



Well, following goats last week, this week we have been immersed in wolves and red capes! How wonderful these traditional tales are catching the children's imagination. The learning has been really superb. Look at these amazing paintings and see the children acting out the story in the classroom during self-chosen play!

This week we have also introduced a new initiative to encourage the children's development. Studies have shown that children who can recite nursery rhymes have far better outcomes in terms of reading and writing, so we want to harness

this and encourage every parent to return a quick video to us each week of their child saying or singing the 'Rhyme of the week'. For some this will be easy, for others more of a challenge, but we know it will make a huge difference and are so grateful to the parents for getting on board with it. #### **Reception: Mary Anning Class**



This week, we have been enjoying the story of 'The Three little Pigs' and have compared different versions of the story, including one with three good little wolves and a big bad pig! The children have made some gorgeous pig pictures and models and were set a challenge to use sweets and cocktail sticks to build a house that we could not blow down. Mrs Turton was very proud of how well they worked together, listened to each other's ideas and helped each other when it was tricky ... and no matter

how hard we tried, we couldn't blow down anyone's house!



Next week, we will be reading 'The Three Billy Goats Gruff' and learning about animal homes and babies.

#### Year 1: Garrett Morgan Class



This week in Maths, Year 1 have been counting on up to 20 using a number line and in English, they have been writing up their story in to a book. In Clarborough Curriculum, the children have been finding out about the Royal family tree. They have been given homework of completing their own family tree. In Science, Year 1 have been planting their sunflower seeds and in French they have been learning how to count to ten. In Computing, the children have been creating a simple melody using patterns.










Next week, in English, the children will be completing their Phonics assessment and in Maths, they will be carrying out subtraction within 10.



#### Year 2: Professor Brian Cox Class

This week, Year 2 have been making equal groups and sharing between 2 or 3, sorting 2D and 3D shapes in Maths and solving multiplication and division problems. In English, the children have been writing their story mountain for their extended write. In Science, they have been learning about life cycles and in Art, they have been continuing with their sewing projects. In Computing, the children have been using Scratch and in French, they have been looking at verbs.







Next week, Year 2 will be making patterns with shapes in Maths and in English, they will be writing their own adventure story.


#### Year 3: Mary Jackson Class




In Maths this week, Year 3 have been finding ½, ¼ and 1/3 of shapes and amounts. In English, they have been creating their own species found in the rainforest. They have also been making notes and gathering information. In Clarborough Curriculum, the children have been looking at animals that live in the rainforest and created a fact file about them. In Science, Year 3 looked at animals and their skeletons and looked at the differences between vertebrates and invertebrates. In Music, the children added arpeggios and melodies and in Art, they completed their drawings on rainforest animals.









Next week, Year 3 will be looking at unit fractions and non-unit fractions, and the equivalence of a half and two quarters in Maths. In English, they will be writing a report about their new species and in Science, they will look at the human skeleton and understand how this supports movement.


#### Year 4: Richard Leakey Class



In Maths this week, Year 4 have been calculating the area and perimeter of compound shapes. They have also had some sessions on converting units of measure. In English, they finished their instructions on how to become a Roman soldier and began planning their newspapers as if we were a Roman sports reporter writing about a gladiatorial match including creating headlines and 5w paragraphs (who, what, where, when and why a story happened). In Clarborough Curriculum, the children looked at the impact of the Roman invasion

on Iron Age tribes and also looked at a village in Malawi and noted the differences between ours. In RE, the children looked at Buddhist religious buildings and in Science, they looked at how sound travels and how we can use mediums to help the sound travel further. In Art, the children continued with line art and this week

made 3D images using straight lines. In Computing, Year 4 continued with their Scratch projects and inserted sprites onto their projects.



Next week, Year 4 will be writing up their newspapers in English and having some Rainbow Grammar sessions. In Maths, they will be looking at time; calculating the passing of time and converting time. In Science, they will be making some telephones and seeing how far we can get the sound to travel. In Art the children will be using straight lines to create perspective and in French, they will continue with talking about our family.

#### Year 5: Hedy Lamarr Class




This week, Year 5 have been multiplying up to 5 digits by a two-digit number, remembering to add zero as a place holder. In English, they have been practising using short sentences; rhetorical questions and ellipsis to build tension and suspense in their narratives. In Clarborough Curriculum, the children have been exploring data showing the climate on different mountain ranges and plotting

this information on a bar or line graph.

In Science the children have been creating and naming their own virtual burgers online and in French they have learnt how to say 'I do not have...' in terms of pets, i.e., 'Je n'ai pas de chat'. Next week, in Maths, Year 5 will be looking at division of up to 4-digit numbers using formal written methods and in English, they will be writing their own suspense filled narratives set on Mount Everest. In Geography, the children will be exploring mountains as tourist destinations.

### Year 6: Alan Turing Class



This week in Maths, Year 6 have been looking at fraction and decimal equivalents, percentages, area & perimeter and algebra! In English, they have been writing persuasive leaflets for Stig's den and in Clarborough Curriculum, they have been writing up their Skara Brae fact files and looking at Stone Age art. In Science, the children have been using the Linnaean system for classification and in Computing they have been looking at how virtual reality can improve environments. In their French lesson, they have been learning how to tell the time.



Next week, Year 6 will be completing their leaflets in English and looking at worded problems linked to fractions, decimals and percentages in Maths. In Clarborough Curriculum, the children will explore copper mining and locate countries on a map where bronze originated from and travelled to.








Well done to Amelia who received her 10m certificate from Swimstars and Dolphins - Super work Amelia!
