

Reception: Mary Anning Class



This week in Mary Anning class, it has been all about pancakes! We have read 'Mr. Wolf's Pancakes' and 'The Runaway Pancake' and then changed the last story to make up our own about a Runaway Cupcake. On Pancake Day we tasted pancakes with three different toppings and then made a chart to show our favourite one - chocolate spread was the winner. The children had lots of fun practising flipping pancakes - especially when one landed on someone's head and another landed on top of the lights! We

have been talking about the ingredients needed to make pancakes and have learnt where those ingredients and other types of food come from.

The children have begun using their 'rainbow writing' books this week - these are books that the children can choose to write in whenever they want to, but they have to do their writing independently. Mrs. Turton and Mrs. Adamson were amazed by how brilliantly the children did and how keen and confident they were to write all by themselves.

Next week, we will be reading the story of 'Supertato', sharing our favourite stories and talking about story characters and settings, ready for World Book day on Friday 3rd March.









Year 1: Garrett Morgan Class




In Maths this week, Year 1 have been adding numbers (within 20) and subtracting two numbers using the part, part whole model. In English, the children have been introduced to a new story 'Here comes Mr Postmouse'. They have also been sequencing the journey of a letter. In Clarborough Curriculum, Year 1 have been looking at and talking about Nelson Mandela and why he was famous. In Science, the children have been observing a day in Spring looking at the wind direction, weather and

temperature and in DT, they have been evaluating different fruit by tasting it. In Computing, they have been placing instructions in the correct sequence.










Next week, Year 1 will be subtracting two numbers in Maths and in English, they will be writing a letter of complaint.



Year 2: Professor Brian Cox Class

This week, Year 2 have been learning how to half numbers in Maths and wrote up their instructions on how to make a pancake in their English lessons. In Clarborough Curriculum, the children have been learning about the Ancient Olympics and in Computing they learnt how to present data using ICT. In French, the children have been learning how to say 'I can..' and a range of verbs in their sentences.

Next week, in Maths, Year 2 will be learning how to measure using standard units such as centimeters and look at how to find a quarter of an amount using fractions.




Year 3: Mary Jackson Class




This week, Year 3 have been looking at time and in particular 'o-clock' and 'half past'. They have been continuing with their 2-, 4- and 8- times tables and comparing statement and related calculations in Maths. In English, the children have been looking at folk tales. They have been looking at what they are, the differences between a folk tale and a fairy tale and finding details in 'The Little Red Riding Hood.'

In Clarborough Curriculum, the children have been discovering facts about the Maya Civilization and the Maya people and in Science the children enjoyed looking at human skeletons and how we move. In Art, Year 3 have been designing a Maya mask and in Computing, they have enjoyed creating digital art. In PE, the children have been learning how to dribble using a hockey stick!








Next week, Year 3 will be multiplying 2 digits by 1 digit and in English, they will be looking at different characters and their different points of view. In Science, the children will continue their work on the human body and look at how bones and muscles work together to create movement.

Year 4: Richard Leakey Class



This week, Year 4 have been counting fractions, subtracting fractions from a whole, looking at fractions greater than 1 and re-visiting equivalent fractions in Maths. In English, the children began looking at explanation writing. The children will be writing about how we hear and looking at using casual conjunctions and how things can be explained in logical steps. In Clarborough Curriculum, Year 4 looked at the layout and development of Roman villas and in Geography, they discussed how settlers would choose a suitable place to live. In Music, the children began to learn their new song 'Lean on Me' and in Science, the children were introduced to the topic of Electricity. The children looked at

appliances that might use electricity in their homes. In Art, they have started on their Roman mosaics and in Computing, their Scratch racing games have been completed.





Next week, Year 4 will be looking at the explanation text 'Until I met Dudley' and will then create their own versions. In Maths, they will calculate quantities and fractions of a quantity together with recapping time word problems. In History, the children will look at Hadrian's wall and understand its importance. In Computing, they will be looking at online safety and in RE, the children will be learning about the holy book and scripture.


Year 5: Hedy Lamarr Class




This week, Year 5 have been converting improper fractions to mixed numbers and mixed numbers to improper fractions. In English, the children have been introduced to their new book 'The Jamie Drake Equation' and looking at punctuating speech correctly. In Science, they have looked at evidence suggesting that the Earth is spherical rather than flat and in RE, the children have looked at whether God intended Jesus to be crucified or whether his crucifixion was a consequence of


events. From this, the children were then able to relate this to their own life events and discuss whether they have control over all their actions.

Next week, Year 5 will be looking at their spellings and their favourite stories in readiness for World Book Day on Friday.





Year 6: Alan Turing Class




This week, Year 6 have been looking at the area of triangles including right angled triangles. They have also been looking at volume by counting cubes. In English, the children started their new class book 'Pig heart boy' by Malorie Blackman, answered their VIPERS questions and made predictions about what the story might be about and inferred details from the images and text.

In Clarborough Curriculum, the children looked at copper mining during the Stone Age and in PE, they played field hockey. Year 6 have been

continuing with their DAaRT work with Officer Lindsey and in Science, they have been looking at blood circulation. In Computing, they continued with their HTML Programming to create their own web pages.

Next week, Year 6 will be looking at volume and converting measures in Maths and writing up a diary entry from Cameron's perspective focusing on cohesive devices. In Clarborough Curriculum, they will be looking at Stonehenge and how it has changed from the Stone Age to present.

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Nottinghamshire County Council use CCTV cars to enforce parking outside of schools. They visit schools in Nottinghamshire and will record whilst passing, the details of any cars parked illegally.
