

This has been a very busy and exciting week in Nursery as we have been learning about the Hindu Festival of Lights – 'Diwali' which takes place this year tomorrow! We have turned our role play area into a Hindu mandir (temple) and the children have loved going into it to listen and dance to the Indian music. They have enjoyed pretending to be Hindus by carefully removing their shoes - and are getting really good at putting them back on again!







We also decorated our hands with mehndi patterns, made clay divas and Rangoli patterns. We continue to appreciate all that technology can bring to our school and this week the parents have been given a virtual tour of the classroom, both when it was beautifully calm before the children came in and again when it was buzzing with action! It has also been good to keep in touch with the children who are self-isolating at home. I am just so proud of my class - they are all going from strength to strength!

# **Reception Bubble Group (Suva)**

This week in Suva class we have been learning all about the Hindu festival of Diwali. Diwali is a festival of light which is celebrated for five days every year in October or November.

We decorated our hands with mehndi patterns!







We also used powder paint and stencils to make Rangoli pictures which bring good luck!



The children made paper lanterns and diva lamps out of clay and then decorated them. Divas are used to decorate Hindu's homes and help Lakshmi, the Hindu goddess of wealth, find her way into people's houses.



Mrs Dean made a Hindu mandir (temple) for us to go in - we had to take off our shoes first as a sign of respect, and then the children could play along with the music using the special instruments

## Year 1 Bubble Group (Seoul)

Year 1 have had a brilliant week of learning. They have worked so hard this week - as always! In Maths, they have been working on their number sentences and in particular, their number bonds to 10. They have picked up this concept quickly and have really thought about the way we write out number sentences correctly. This week they have also used the Numicon shapes to help them consolidate their learning. We will continue to look at number bonds to 10 again next week. The children particularly enjoyed playing 'Number Bond Bang Bang' - It was great fun and the children had to really think about what they had learnt!







In English, the children have planned and developed their own poems based on Bonfire Night. It has been a great week for vocabulary as they children have really thought about the different senses we have and how to use them in their writing. They have been looking at adjectives and how they make sentences more exciting to read. Some children were even coming up with expanded noun phrases – WOW! We read the book 'Sparks in the Sky'. The children thoroughly enjoyed the story and used a lot of the ideas in their own writing.





The children have developed their typing skills again this week. Trying to use both hands was very difficult but the children tried their best and are definitely getting better and better at identifying and finding the different letters on the keypad!





For Remembrance Day, the children watched a video clip of 'The Bunny in the Fields'. We talked about how the bunny felt at different parts of the video: before the war, during the war and after. The children understood the significance of the poppies and how they represent the different people who have fought in the war and continue to do so.


We created some beautiful pieces of work from our discussion using water colours.






On Wednesday, they created their own Poppy art using pictures from World War One and watercolours. The children stood and remembered this time during the two minutes silence the school held.


In Maths, the children have been reading and writing numbers to 100 and beyond, and counting amounts using their knowledge of tens and ones.

Next week we will begin to learn how to tie shoelaces!




Also next week, the children will write a letter to Mr A Wolf in prison and look at different points of view including that of Mrs Pig and Alexander Wolf. In Maths, they will compare and order objects and numbers, and count in 2's, 5's and 10's. In Topic, they will identify countries involved in World War II and locate these on a world map. In Science, they will find out and describe the basic needs of humans and animals and identify the ways that different animals meet these basic needs.



# Year 3 Bubble Group (Zagreb)


This week Zagreb class have enjoyed learning about the Earth beneath our feet. They explored the Earth's layers and found out about its magnetic field. They then really enjoyed investigating magnet strength and learnt all about working scientifically by demonstrating their prediction skills, listing their equipment and recording their results as well as ensuring they conducted a fair test.





In Art, they took inspiration from Remembrance Day and created the most amazing art pieces!





In Maths, they continued to secure their subtraction knowledge and recapped exchanging. They all remembered our rhyme "If there's more on the floor, you knock next door!"

In English, they created some great 'Wanted' posters for The Iron Man. They explored different settings using their senses and then used these to create some great setting descriptions based on The Iron Man.







# Year 4 Bubble Group (Riga)

This week in Year 4, the children have been learning about Roman Numerals up to 1,000. The children then created their own Roman numerals with concrete resources such as straws and dienes.







In Science, they have continued their learning on the Digestive system - getting very messy when recreating the process using items such as: tights, orange juice, crackers and bananas! They were able to explain the process as it was happening and understood what each part represented.









In English, Year 4 had a go at writing an alternative ending to a chapter of 'The Demon Dentist' – there were some fantastic pieces of writing!



# **Year 5 Bubble Group (Caracas)**

This week, Caracas have thoroughly enjoyed reading more of our class text 'Charlotte's Web'. With multiple copies, the children are always engaged, following the story and reading aloud. They have been practising their inference skills; thinking about why the characters behave the way they do and finding evidence in the text to support their ideas.






In Maths, they have learned how to read, interpret and draw line graphs, which has been challenging but also very rewarding.

They have learned the importance of using a ruler to plot points on their graph and join points together. They have created their own graphs using information from tables and spotted mistakes in other people's graphs.

I am really proud with how resilient they have been!



In Science, Caracas have been learning all about puberty and the changes that happen to their bodies during this time. Miss Mayhew and Mrs Beswarick have been very impressed with how maturely and sensibly they have listened, asked questions and discussed what they have learned.

On Wednesday, as well as participating in a two minute silence, they created some silhouettes using water colours to create a bright background against which their silhouettes stand. Some really beautiful and powerful art work was produced.







Next week, they will be continuing their work on 'Charlotte's Web' by exploring the themes of the text. In Maths, they will be learning to read tables (including timetables) and in Science they will be exploring gestation and life expectancy. They will also be learning to log in to Office365 to ensure they are ready for learning at home, should it happen.



**English - Blackout Poetry** 
















# English - Modal Verbs
