Toys and Fidget Toys

Please note that fidget toys or any other sort of toy <u>should not</u> be brought into school unless you have spoken with your teacher and they have permitted your child to bring it in.

We have set up our Christmas Jumper Swap Shop in school. If your child has outgrown their Christmas jumper, bring it in and swap it for another Christmas jumper in our Swap shop. Further, if your child does not have a Christmas jumper and would like to have one for our Christmas jumper day next Friday, 17th December, then please feel free to take one from the table. Any jumper donations are welcome!



Lateral Flow Tests and Illness

We continue to see positive COVID cases in our surrounding area and thank you for your support in getting your child a PCR test if they have symptoms or are unwell. I would like to share this guidance from Nottinghamshire County Council to remind you that positive cases can only be confirmed by a PCR test via post or a testing centre and not through LFT tests.



Reminder: LFD testing is not recommended for children under 11

We wanted to remind you that parents of children aged under 11 should not be advised to use LFD tests with these children, as this would not be in line with national guidance.

Information for the public on <u>ordering lateral flow test kits</u> states that people should only use the service if they are aged 11 or over, and the <u>NHS website on rapid testing</u> also states that children under 11 do not need to do rapid tests.

If children are identified as close contacts of a confirmed coronavirus case by national Test & Trace, they will be advised to get a PCR test, unless they are aged four and under, when they will only be advised to get a PCR test if they are living in a household where there is a confirmed coronavirus case.

It's also that time of year when other illnesses are around. This information (below) is from the NHS to provide support should you be unsure whether your child should attend school.

Year 1 (Joan Miro)




This week, the children have improved their speaking and listening skills as the Christmas Story is almost ready for you to see.


Spellings will not be sent home this week. Instead, a bespoke phonics pack will be sent home for some extra special Ho, Ho, Ho Homework over the Christmas holiday!

In English, the children used the M&S Christmas advert as a stimulus for writing. They used their senses to describe what Percy Pig would feel, see,

hear, smell and touch when roaming the empty shelves of the shop.

On Monday, the children also took part in a 'Big Write' morning where they wrote about their life as a window. They thought carefully about what they could see through the window and used their phonics to sound out words and put these into a sentence.





On Wednesday, as part of RE afternoon, the children thought about the importance of 'presents' and why we give and receive presents at Christmas. They were very excited to see a large present in the classroom and after lots of wondering and anticipation, they opened the gift. The children were told that inside the present was the most special gift. They each took a turn to peek inside the box, only to see themselves looking back!





The children also learned about the three wise men from our Christmas story and the importance of the gifts they brought for baby Jesus.

Year 2 (L.S. Lowry)




Year 2 have been working extremely hard this week, alongside Year 1 to practise and rehearse our Nativity ready for next week. We have been up to the church for a visit and to see where we will be sitting for our performance up there. We are hoping to see lots of you at our performances next week and I know the children will love to see you there too.

As well as lots of rehearsing, the children have been busy with their learning too. We have been looking through the common exception words that the children need to learn from Year 1 and Year 2. They need to read and write these words on sight. Once these have been completed we shall send the words your child still needs to learn home with them so they can keep practising them with you as well as in school.

In Maths this week, we have been revisiting telling the time. The children enjoyed this and were very happy when we got the little clocks out for them to practise with. Once they had shown a few times on their clocks they had to say what time was shown on different clocks and write it down. We were very impressed with how much the children had remembered from last year.





On Wednesday afternoon we looked at the 'good news' part of the Christmas story as part of our whole school RE day. The children thought about the good news that the angels brought to the shepherds in their field. We then made some angels and thought about what good news the angels might bring to the world today.



We have also continued to look at Moses as part of our RE topic. We found out how God parted the Red Sea to help rescue his people from Pharaoh when he had again changed his mind even after God had sent the 10 plagues. After they had got through the Red Sea and were making their way through the desert, God gave Moses some rules that his people had to follow. We discussed how these rules are important to Christians even today and what rules we have to follow in different places such as home and school.







We are really looking forward to our Nativity and lots of Christmas activities in school next week.

Christmas gonks and, I think you'll agree, they make the tree look much better!


The children will be bringing home their decorations to hang on their own





In English, the children have been analysing and writing their own explanation text to explain how their robot dogs work. They have found thinking of technical words for the dog's body parts hilarious! They have also been learning to improve the quality of the adjectives they choose, how to start sentences with adverbs and include questions, statements, commands and exclamations in their writing to keep the reader interested.

In Maths, the children have moved away from learning written methods to add and subtract 3-digit numbers and onto multiplication as repeated addition. We recapped the 2, 5 and 10 times table on Tuesday and have moved on to calculating and looking for patterns in the 3x, 4x and 8x tables. The children have already worked incredibly hard and made terrific progress. I have included a few pictures to show you how much they have produced in just a couple of days...










On Wednesday afternoon the children spent time thinking about the meaning of Christmas to Christians. We looked at the painting called 'The Light of the World' and thought about why Christians thought Jesus was the light of the world. We looked at candles in relation to the lighting up of the darkness, showing the way, bringing calmness and being an inspiration to others. We started learning a song called 'Show me the way to shine for Jesus' and made lanterns.




In French, we have been learning to count to 11 and playing a game to help us and in PE we had our last gymnastics session because next Thursday it is the class Christmas party.

In Geography this week, the children have looked at the cause and effect of Tsunamis. They all worked very hard and the work they have produced has been very impressive. The children showed great understanding of how the tectonic plates beneath the earth's surface are moving all the time, and how this can cause earthquakes, and when this happens under the sea it can lead to a tsunami. They had very mature conversations about the devastation this can cause.

To end our topic of 'Extreme Earth' the children completed a 'show me what you know' sheet. They all worked very hard and as you can see, the end results were wonderful. The children definitely showcased their learning of this topic in their own way. Well done Year 3!

In Maths, the children have been interpreting charts and practising their 7 times table.

In Science and Topic, they have been completing their end of unit overviews all about the knowledge they have gained over the past few weeks.

In RE, they participated in the whole school RE focus afternoon. Our theme has been 'journeys' so they focused on the journey of Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem before the birth of Jesus and considered the challenges of their life journey. They had so much fun role playing, looking at an ancient map and using a route planner to plot the distances and times that Mary and Joseph took.









Next week, the children will be participating in lots of Christmas activities, including; singing around the Christmas tree, having a Christmas lunch and enjoying a Christmas party.

Year 5 (Banksy)



On Wednesday, we enjoyed our RE themed afternoon based on the Christmas Story and the theme of peace - both in the hearts of people and in the world at large. After watching a short film based on the Christmas Story, they examined a selection of artefacts and pictures on the theme of peace and were asked to think of one word which connects them all. They then discussed the different meanings of peace and completed a reflective piece about living in harmony with others. Finally, they designed versions of the Christian cross to express what is important in their lives.

Year 6 (Lucian Freud)

This week, we have had a very busy time! In English, we wrote our short story based upon the title 'life through a window'. These short stories were fantastic and the children transported me from location to location with their vivid description. We had stories from football grounds, skyscrapers, our own classroom and even a window in a bakery in 1666 that watched as the forgetful assistant forgot to put out the fire causing the great fire.

After we finished our stories, we returned to our biographies about Adolf Hitler which we will share next week.

In Maths this week we have been looking at all things angle related. The children learnt to identify angles from what they look like, estimate their size and then measure them with accuracy using a protractor. We ended the week with an angle related murder mystery and drawing angles with Mrs Cowell-Clark.

In Computing, the children have been looking at how to edit and improve images. We have taken some stock images of landmarks and played around with cropping and colour corrections to try to make them look even better. During this, the children used Google Maps and street view to find a world land mark of their choice to try to edit.

In the afternoons this week, the children have been taking part in some career related activities that they began in Year 5. This week we looked at what a cover letter is, building up on something they began last year, and what it might be like to go for a job interview. We had some children as an interviewing panel and others interviewees and they ran 'mock' interviews for a fictitious job. They then had to self and peer assess how they though they did.

Rounding off the week, we had a RE afternoon where each year group looked at a different aspect of the Nativity story. In Year 6, we had the idea of 'incarnation' and how Jesus being delivered to Earth as an incarnation of God. The children recreated a famous painting by creating the hands of God delivering Jesus to Earth.









I have been immensely proud of how hard the pupils of Year 6 have worked this week and I am sure we can keep it up for the last week.

And remember: At Christmas, it's not the presents that are under the tree that matters. It's the love and people who are gathered around it.
