This week, we have been thinking about how hair grows and linking it to the story of Rapunzel so there has been much fun in our role play of hairdressers as well as building castles both inside and outside. It is a joy to see the children exploring the environment, creating new things from all that is around them, although we did have to explain to Myles that he couldn't take this collage home!

World Book Day has been a huge success and we are looking forward to seeing how many children meet the bedtime story challenge!







Reception: Mary Anning Class



This week, the children in Mary Anning class have enjoyed listening to lots of stories about 'Supertato'. They made superheroes using real potatoes and designed their own super veggies. The children have also been shopping in our fruit and vegetable shop and we used the real food in there to talk about how long food lasts and why it's important to store food in the correct way. On World Book Day we had great fun dressing in our pyjamas and sharing our favourite books with each other.

Next week, we will be enjoying activities linked to the story of 'Jack and the Beanstalk'.





We were also very lucky this week when Kiki brought in some traditional bracelets for us and some information about Martenitsa. A Martenitsa is a small ornament (usually a bracelet or a brooch), most often made of wool or cotton yarn in two basic colours – white and red, which Bulgarians tie around their wrists or clip on their clothes each year on March 1st for health and good luck.

Thank you Kiki – we loved learning about this Bulgarian tradition!

Year 1: Garrett Morgan Class



In Maths this week, Year 1 have been looking at subtraction within 20 and number formation within 20. In English, the children have been working towards achieving their Sparkly Pen Licence. A big congratulations to Willow and Elliott who achieved their Sparkly Pen Licence this week – Amazing work!

The children in Year 1

have also been writing their complaint letters to a Baker and in Clarborough Curriculum, they have been finding out facts about Nelson Mandela. In Geography, Year 1 have been creating a map of the school grounds and marking geographical features on it and in Art, they have been describing fruit. In Computing, the children have been programming using direction and in Science, they have been observing the weather in Spring.





Next week, Year 1 will be looking at time in Maths and writing a postcard in English.

<u>Please note, on Monday 6th March, Phonics screening homework will be starting.</u> On Monday, please find the QR code on Seesaw and a short video will be uploaded each week.

Year 2: Professor Brian Cox Class



This week, in Maths, Year 2 have been looking at fractions – $\frac{1}{4}$ and $\frac{1}{2}$. In English, they have been researching the Olympics to write a fact file. In Clarborough Curriculum, the children looked at the ancient Olympics and compared it to the modern day Olympics. In Art, they have been exploring lines and seeing how to make different patterns and in Computing, they have been creating a pictogram.





Year 3: Mary Jackson Class



In Maths, Year 3 have been looking at 'quarter to' and 'quarter past' in their Maths lessons. They have also been multiplying a 2 digit number by a 1 digit number using the column method including exchanging. In English, the children have been using fronted adverbials to write a description of Chichen Itza, used inverted commas for speech and re-told the story of 'The Chocolate Tree'. In Clarborough Curriculum, they have looked at the Maya beliefs and how they worshipped some of the Gods including Kukulkan and in Art, Year

3 have created Maya masks using their designs from last week. In Science, the children have looked at how bones and muscles work together to create movement.

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Next week, Year 3 will be looking at the months and years, and dividing 2 digit numbers by 1 digit numbers. In English, they will plan their own folk tale and in Clarborough Curriculum, they will be looking at the Maya writing system and how words were constructed.

Year 4: Richard Leakey Class



This week, Year 4 have been deepening their understanding of fractions in Maths. They have been looking at subtracting a fraction from a whole and calculating a fraction of a quantity with word problems. In English, the children finished their explanation texts. They used the book 'Until I met Dudley' to create some fantastical explanations, for example, dragons that live in a kettle to help boil water. Then they used all of their knowledge to write an explanation on how we hear sound. In Clarborough Curriculum, Year 4 looked at Hadrian's wall and learnt why it was so important in defending the South. In PSHE, the children were

taught digital safety and discussed how to be kind online and in Science, Year 4 looked at electrical circuits and how to use accurate symbols to help draw and build a complete circuit. In Art, the children created some monstrous beasts as part of World Book Day and in Computing, they started their 3D modelling topic.

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Next week, Year 4 will be adding and subtracting fractions in Maths and beginning to look at a new book 'The boy who harnessed the wind'. In Clarborough Curriculum, the children will be looking at the revolution of Boudicca and in Science, they will recognise and complete circuits.

Year 5: Hedy Lamarr Class



This week, Year 5 have been comparing and ordering fractions in Maths and in English, they have been reading more of 'The Jamie Drake Equation'. The children have been looking more deeply into how to write a diary entry using features including sentence starters. In PSHE, the children have

been sharing thoughts and feelings and understanding why it is important that we do share these. In Science, Year 5 have been naming, ordering and describing the features of each of the planets in the solar system.

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Next week, Year 5 will be writing their own diary entries linked to our class book and looking at how the planets move within the solar system in Science, and continuing with fractions in Maths.

Year 6: Alan Turing Class



This week, Year 6 have been drafting their diary entries based on Cameron's visit to Dr Bryce and in Maths, they have been calculating ratios and proportion. In Science, they have been looking at how the bloods flows around the body and in Clarborough Curriculum, they have been creating fact files about Stonehenge.

Next week, in Maths, the children will be looking at pie charts and working out the mean average. In English, they will be completing their diary entries and begin to write a newspaper report. In Art, Year 6 will be sketching Stonehenge and in French, they will be looking at healthy foods.

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Nottinghamshire County Council use CCTV cars to enforce parking outside of schools. They visit schools in Nottinghamshire and will record whilst passing, the details of any cars parked illegally.

If vehicles are in parked in contravention the registered keepers will receive a Penalty Charge Notice.

These restrictions are in place to provide a safe area outside of the school where the children will gather or cross the road therefore, we ask for your help in keeping this area free of parked vehicles. The school can request enforcement from the car if there any concerns regarding parking.
