

In Science, the children looked at a range of life cycles before creating their own. They also looked at a range of foods and then sorted them into groups of either plant, animal or both. The children also enjoyed a pop-up farm shop in the classroom and wrote their shopping lists before finding the correct coins. 






# Year 2 (L.S. Lowry)




We have had a really fun week finding out about food and farming this week.


The children have learnt about the farming of animals, crops and plants, and how this becomes the food we eat.

We have talked about how we can get different foods from animals. For example, from a cow we can get beef, steak and burgers whilst we can also get milk which in turn produces cheese!

Following on from our discussions, the children had to then sort a variety of foods to say where they came from.



In English, we have learnt about adverbial phrases and we have linked this to our enhancement week on Food and Farming as well. An adverbial phrase is a phrase used within a sentence to add more information about where something is happening or has happened. The children had a few pictures linked to harvest time and they had to write a sentence containing two adverbial phrases. They produced some really great sentences, here are just a couple of them:





The children have been using their knowledge of number facts and number bonds they learnt in Year 1 in Maths this week. We have looked at number facts such as; if we know 8 + 2 = 10 we can also work out that 80 + 20 = 100. Over the half term break, see if your child can practise this skill and record different ways of making 100.

As part of our curriculum enhancement week and the Clarborough Cook off, we looked at the country, Mexico and made some guacamole. The children had lots of fun, finding out how to make guacamole and actually making the dish before we took it to the hall along with all the other creations for Mrs Cowell-Clark to taste. We had fun tasting it ourselves in class first, just to make sure it tasted good enough to eat!



Year 2 pupils have come home from school with a phonics pack. Please have a look at this and work with your child on the phonemes (sounds) to help them prepare for their phonics assessment later on this year.

We have had such a busy first half term back at school and thank you children, for all your hard work and parents for all your support. We hope you have an amazing, restful couple of weeks and can't wait to hear all about your adventures when we return to school at the beginning of November.

### Year 3 (William Morris)



In English this week, the children have been learning about the story of Theseus and the Minotaur and then created fantastic descriptions of the terrifying monster.

In Maths, the children have produced some great work in addition and subtraction. The children have also been calculating perimeter. They designed their own dairy farms and measured the perimeter of each building on their farm.

We have had two brilliant days of planning and preparing our food for our special Food and Farming week. The children learned about beekeeping and tasted honey that had been prepared by the beekeeper. Everyone enjoyed the honey!

As part of our Greek topic we had a special Greek food day on Wednesday. Children listened to Greek music and enjoyed olives, feta cheese, made their own tzatziki, Greek spinach pie and vine leaves stuffed with rice. What an amazing day!

A delicious lunch was made by Class 3 on Thursday which included pumpkin soup, bread and apple crumble. It was fun and messy! We even used the pumpkin seeds for Maths. How many seeds do you think are in a small pumpkin? Estimates were from 40 to 90. After arranging the seeds in groups of 10, then counting in 10s there were actually ...637!



In Science the children took part in an investigation. Could we make plastic out of milk? Yes! Unfortunately, the mixture was very crumbly and so hard to mold into a shape but it has turned into plastic!

# Year 4 (Salvador Dali)



This week the children have really enjoyed learning all about Food and Farming!

The children harvested vegetables from our school garden. A huge thank you for all of your donations too!







In Science, the children received a letter from Shaun the Sheep asking for help with creating a new plantation system to enable crops to grow in winter. They carried out an investigation of making their own mini green houses. They ensured they were carrying out a fair test by only changing one variable. Some children will be taking them home to look after over half term ... they may need help remembering to water them and please bring them back afterwards so we can complete our booklets!

Science: Plant growing investigation



For the Clarborough Cook off the children followed a Portuguese recipe to make Areias de Cascais or Sand biscuits. They were delicious and everyone wanted more!





The children also held a class competition called the 'Squashed Tomato Challenge'. They each had a tomato and access to recycled materials and they had to wrap their tomato so it was protected and didn't get squashed when being dropped from a height. We had so much fun!

Homework: Over half term, the children will be bringing home their Maths homework book. Their pages are labelled with what they need to complete (and I've popped this on Seesaw too). It would be beneficial for all children to ensure they are still reading and quizzing and practising their time tables too. Thank you for your continued support!

# Year 5 (Banksy)




Banksy Class have thoroughly enjoyed our Food and Farming week, engaging in a variety of different activities.

Initially, they explored the idea of food connections by comparing runner beans grown in the UK with those grown in Africa. They played a domino-style game to learn about the production process involved in both countries before comparing the positive and negative impacts of growing beans in both countries. It was fantastic to hear the children use words such as 'climate change', 'pollution,' and 'global responsibility' in their mature conversations and ideas.



Using our sketchbooks, the children have explored making marks using different mediums. They used techniques such as stippling and hatching using pencil, charcoal, felt tip and pastels. They then applied these

techniques to sketching a single lollipop. Following this, they explored the work of Wayne Thiebaud, an American painter who paints foods such as cakes, lollipops and sundaes, before sketching their own cakes in his style.





In English, they watched a short, animated film about an innovator called Geoff, who works in a baked bean factory, and designs new bean tins for different numbers of people e.g. the one for one, the one for two and the one for all. This led the children to design their own bean tins such as: the one for unicorns, the one for special occasions and the one for football skills!



We have also had lot of discussion about food miles and а enjoyed using the website <u>https://www.foodmiles.com/food/calculator</u> to calculate the miles that some commonly eaten foods have travelled before arriving in our homes.

Participating in 'The Great Clarborough Cook Off' on Thursday meant that we were able to make and sample our Brigadeiro (Belgian truffles). They were delicious!

Finally, the pupils completed their assessment pieces based on what they have learned about the Tudors.

As part of their learning about Inspirational People in RE, Banksy Class have been finding out about William Booth, who founded The Salvation Army. William Booth established this church and charity to support families living in poverty and his legacy still continues today. The Salvation Army operates in over 120 countries worldwide offering support and advice to those in need. Pupils in Banksy Class decided to support this charity by making a donation to the local charity shop in Retford.

# Year 6 (Lucian Freud)

This week, Class 6 have been working flat out! It has been our Food and Farming enrichment week and so, all of our activities have had an agriculture feel to them and I can honestly say, that we have had a huge amount of fun this week.

In Maths, we have designed and created our own farms, costing up how much it would be to buy and run a farm and how much we would need to sell our products for in order to make a profit. The diversity of ideas that we had was amazing. We had alpaca fur farms, beef farms, rare-breed rabbit farms and even a scorpion venom farm! A few of

the children managed to make a small profit while most ended up hundreds of thousands and in one case millions in debt.

This week the children wrote stories from the perspective of a carrot or other root vegetable being dug up from its home by a tractor. We had to describe the terror and the anguish of being tucked up safe in the mud before being ripped from the earth by a huge beast to be packaged off only to wake up later in a supermarket. We also created harvest sunset art using a decoupage/ collage style.





Year 6 tried to make bottle-less water bottles using the spherification process - ask about them all about it!

We rounded our Thursday off with designing the tractor of the future and cooking a Spanish omelette for Mrs Cowell-Clark to taste in assembly.





At the end of the week, the children held a debate about veganism and discussed whether people should go vegan or vegetarian in order to protect the planet. The children researched their own ideas and then debated with each other. We sang harvest songs to the tune of 'Shotgun' and 'Castle on the Hill' and I challenged the children to make up their own harvest song to the tune of a popular song.

Finally, in the wise words of Winnie the Pooh:

'Life is a journey to be experienced, not a problem to be solved'.
