Reception Bubble Group (Suva)


This week we have been looking at the different sorts of vehicles that are used on farms. We have talked about why tractors need such huge wheels and tyres, and about combine harvesters and what they do.


We have also learnt that a farmer's job is to produce food and have talked about the many different types of food that they grow.

We have made model tractors and farm pictures, carried on writing in our books and made repeating patterns!

## Year 1 Bubble Group (Seoul)

It has been a great week in class Seoul! The children have completed some fantastic learning and had a focus on shapes again this week in Maths. They have been looking at repeating patterns and how we can use shapes to make imaginative and reoccurring patterns.

The children have taken part in lots of activities to create repeating patterns: using 2D and 3D shapes, cutting out different shapes, drawing their own patterns, using Play-Doh and finding the missing pattern in a sequence.

In English it has been another jam packed week of working on their fine motor skills. The children have really focused well on their hand writing skills and holding their pencil correctly. There has been lots of letter practise, sentence work, cvc words and phonics. Super work Year 1!


On Wednesday, the children had a brilliant afternoon creating some Art. They mixed the 3 primary colours to find out all the different shades and colours they could make. It was great fun and the children produced some lovely art work.


Year 1 Star of the week: Freddie 0 for trying so hard to write his name and for always being so polite!

## Year 2 Bubble Group (Wellington)

This week has been full of new learning and another successful week in Wellington Class.

In English, the children have been finding examples of information texts and looking at the features such as contents page, index and glossary as well as putting words into alphabetical order.


In Maths, the children have been learning about fractions and finding a half, a quarter and a third of amounts.


We have continued to learn about Mary Seacole and wrote letters to her, commending her for the work that she did.

They had the opportunity to see, feel, smell and taste some of the ingredients that she used for her herbal remedies. The children crushed lemongrass and aloe vera with a pestle and mortar and tried a slice of lemon as well as drinking honey and lemon with hot water. Ben brought in an aloe Vera plant for us to cut and see! Mary Seacole used this to treat the soldier's cuts and wounds during the Crimean war. Thank you Ben!


On Thursday afternoon they created paintings using tints that they had created by adding white paint to a colour.

Next week the children will learn how to multiply and divide 2 's, 5 's and 10 's and compete on TT Rockstars! They will pretend that Mary Seacole is visiting school and think of interesting questions to ask her. They will design a fact sheet about Mary Seacole using features of information texts. In Art and Design they will look at warm and cool colours, and compare and contrast these.

The children loved the special lunch on Thursday and it was great to see children trying a school lunch for the first time!

## Year 2 Star of the week: Ben for being a Maths superstar and putting in a lot of effort with his handwriting!

## Year 3 Bubble Group (Zagreb)

This week Zagreb class have been retelling the myths of Pandora's Box, and Theseus and the Minotaur. The children have used these to inform their own mythical story. They have had great fun creating their own characters and settings and have produced some fantastic writing.


Year 3 have also been learning about Greek Gods this week.

In Maths, the children have worked incredibly hard to understand place value to both 100 and 1000 numbers.


Following the Clarborough curriculum, the children have analysed the designs of Ancient Greek chariots and had a go at creating their own, they then really enjoyed having their very own chariot race!


Finally, in French they have been learning how to say hello, how are you and what is your name...we have some brilliant French accents too!

Next week, Zagreb will be researching Alexander the Great and will be creating fact files on Microsoft word. They will also be exploring the defeat of the Persian Empire army by Athens and Sparta. In Maths they will be comparing numbers to 100 or 1000 and will be consolidating their knowledge on place value. Finally in French they will be counting to 10 and learning their colour names.

## Year 4 Bubble Group (Riga)

Year 4 have been working really hard this week in all subjects. In Maths this week, the children have focused on their reasoning and problem solving skills, and answering questions based on different measurements of length. It has been quite tricky, and some children found it challenging, but the discussions have been fantastic and the children are learning how to answer these questions with more and more clarity.

In English, the children have been continuing to read the fireworkmakers daughter and they have just read Lila's experience with the fire fiend in the grotto. It was a fantastic read, with lots of description. The children's task was to write their own detailed piece of writing about Lila's experience. They worked really hard to create a descriptive passage and include lots of technical devices including expanded noun phrases, fronted adverbials, similes and personification.

In Topic, the children have completed their hierarchy work and have shown a great understanding of what it was like for people to live during the Shang Dynasty.

There was great discussion about where they would like to be in the social hierarchy and why. It was a very different time and people were heavily judged on the different jobs they had.


This week in Art, year 4 have been studying eye artwork and have tried to use their best sketching skills to draw their own eye. They began by trying their first attempt, then after a tutorial on how to sketch and shade, were able to display their much improved pieces of art!


Next week, they will be creating their own Cinquain and Onomatopoeia poems based on their class book 'The Magic Paintbrush'. They will also be learning how to place numbers on a number line up to 10,000 , Finding $10,100,1,000$ more or less and to compare 4 and 5 digit numbers (with some children challenging themselves with decimals).

## Year 4 Star of the week: Saffron because she has worked exceedingly hard all week to ensure her work is the absolute best it can be. She has been so helpful all week and has a beaming smile on her face always!

## Year 5 Bubble Group (Caracas)

This week, Year 5 have worked extremely hard in all areas and Miss Mayhew is very proud of the work that has been produced.

In Maths, they have compared numbers using the < and > signs and worked with negative numbers, solving problems involving counting back through zero.

In English, the children have learned about punctuating speech correctly and had fun re-writing a fake text from Henry VIII using direct speech.


As part of our Computing topic, which is learning about computer networks, they used Seesaw to produce a mock email to a classmate.


Continuing our learning about Tudors, they learned about three significant black Tudors (Jacques Francis, Diego and John Blanke) and their historical significance. They also produced some excellent sketches of The Mary Rose after learning about Jacques Francis, who was a salvage diver.


Next week, they will begin to learn about significant Tudor Explorers, including Sir Francis Drake and Christopher Columbus and will be able to explain their historical importance. In Maths, they will be adding and subtracting numbers mentally as well as using formal written methods. In English, we will use the picture book, 'Can I Build Another Me?' (postponed from this week) to celebrate difference and understand how we are all unique. We will also be putting some of our GPS skills to the test.

Year 5 Star of the week: Amelie for working so extremely hard work this week, particularly in English when using speech punctuation correctly!

## Year 6 Bubble Group (Havana)



Maths:
This week we have been consolidating our understanding of column addition and subtraction both with integers and decimals. All the children excelled at this and next week we move onto the final 2 operations - multiplication and division.

English:
We have now begun doing VIPERS with our class book, ensuring the children are being challenged and understanding everything we are reading. Thanks to ELS, all the children now have individual copies. This week in SPaG we have looked at many tricky concepts: personification, onomatopoeia, metaphors and similes. We have also recapped our understanding of relative clauses. Next week we aim to apply our SPaG knowledge to a setting description.


Art:
Year 6 have been looking at the work of Henri Rousseau, who was famous for the drawing of Tiger in a Tropical Storm. We have broken the picture down into the background and the animal and begun attempting our own 'post-impressionism' art. Hopefully we will have finished pieces next week.


P.E

This week we started our new sport of Handball. The children began comparing how the skills from basketball are transferable and playing games to develop these skills using larger balls. Next week, the children will use correct size handballs and start to develop their knowledge around the rules.
