What is the Summer Reading Challenge?

Produced by The Reading Agency and in partnership with libraries across the country, the Summer Reading Challenge is a great way to keep children reading over the summer. Taking part can help avoid the potential dip in reading levels over the long summer break and provides free fun for 4 - 11 year olds.

This year's challenge is **Story Garden**, celebrating nature and the great outdoors and exploring adventure, fantasy and the magical world of storytelling.

The challenge runs in Inspire Nottinghamshire libraries from 5 July until 7 September.

How does the Summer Reading Challenge work?


We are absolutely thrilled to announce that together we raised an incredible £3,100!









Nursery and 30hrs

We have also learnt how to keep hydrated in the hot weather (check the colour of your wee!) and how to handle wasps coming near us. The children have learnt that the wasps are simply checking to see if they are flowers and by standing very still the wasps usually fly off again. To see little ones being so calm and sensible is a real achievement we are proud of! Thanks as always to the Nursery parents for your support through this year. Reception





What a busy half-term it has been in Canada class! We have been learning about ways that we can move on land, in the air, on water and in space, and how the forces of pushing and pulling make things move.

We began by looking at the different ways in which our bodies can move and why it's important to look after our bodies and be healthy.

Next, we learnt about vehicles that travel on land; how they are able to move on roads and rails, and how they are adapted to travel across mud, sand and snow. The children also designed and built bridges strong enough to hold lots of toy vehicles without collapsing, and we finished with a Jolly Journeys Day where the children could come to school on their bikes and scooters.

We found out that some vehicles, such as planes, gliders and hot air balloons, can travel through the air, and did an experiment with balloons to show how rockets move through space when the force of the hot gas pushes against the air.

When we learnt about vehicles that travel on or under water the children experimented to see what materials float and sink and used what they had found out to make a boat that would float.

In Maths we learnt to share fairly, began to double and halve small amounts and identified odd and even numbers.

The children also took part in Sports Day and had great fun at C-Fest, before finishing the year with a Pirate Day.

I would like to thank the Reception children for a fantastic year; it's been wonderful to watch them grow in confidence and to see their brains becoming even more sparkly! They are a truly lovely group of children and I will miss them next year. Thank you, children!













Year 1

In Maths, we started our learning this half term on 'time.' Their learning began by talking about the days of the week and months of the year. They also used mini clocks to help them to recognise the minute and hour hand. The children have been working extremely hard and were so excited to tell the time to the hour and half past.

We have also been looking at coins and notes. The children had a go at paying for items using real coins and notes and some children even had to count the coins to make the correct amount.



In English this half term, the children looked at different shape poems. They explored the rhyming and rhythm of a shape poem and even had a go at making their own shape poem that included a rhyming pair and adjectives.

We then moved onto a film unit called 'Dangle'. The children have been remembering their capital letters, finger spaces and full stops ready for Year 2. Everyone has worked so hard to produce their own independent write.

In Clarborough Curriculum, the children started their topic on Kings and Queens. They have loved learning about past and present monarchs including; Queen Victoria, Queen Elizabeth II and King Charles III. Well done to all the children for your creative homework on designing your own crown. They were all amazing!

In Science, the children have been identifying and naming the 5 animal groups, including fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds and mammals. They have learnt what it means if an animal is a carnivore, herbivore and omnivore.

In Art, the children have been learning about primary and secondary colours. They have explored the 3 primary colours, red, blue and yellow and used clay and paint to mix them to make secondary colours, purple, orange and green. The children enjoyed using Lego to print the paint onto their page.

In Computing, the children have been so excited to create their own comic book on a laptop. They worked together in pairs to insert a background, add characters and speech bubbles and some children even wanted to challenge themselves to add more panels onto their comic.



Year 2

In Maths this half term the children have covered time, capacity, mass and statistics. The children have drawn and interpreted tables, tally charts, block diagrams and pictograms in Statistics. They have practised telling the time at 5-minute intervals and should know how many minutes are in one hour, seconds in a minute and hours in a day.

The children have learnt about whole turns, half turns and quarter turns in their learning on position and direction. They have also practised their right and left turns.

The children have learnt to read scales to measure mass and capacity. They have also answered questions about mass and capacity using addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.





Year 2 have written their own shape poems. They looked at lots of examples from the book 'Apes to Zebras.' We then chose to write about a sea otter. The children thought of some rhyming words to describe a sea otter and then wrote their poem using these. The finished poems were great!

We enjoyed learning about postcards and why people choose to send them. We then compared these to letters. Everyone wrote to the Helping Hands PTA to thank them for

the ice lollies and everything they do to support school – we were all very excited when we received individual letters back!

The children have been learning about Christopher Columbus and Captain James Cook as part of their history this term. They have learnt a little about their lives and why they were famous explorers. The children then located on a map some of the countries the two explorers visited. This led us nicely into some Geography work about Australia. We have been exploring the landscape, famous landmarks and human and physical features.





During Science, the children have identified that most living things live in habitats to which they are suited and have described how habitats provide for the basic needs of different kinds of animals and plants as well as how they depend on each other.

In Computing, we have been developing our touch-typing skills and will continue to work on this when we move to Year 3.

In Art, we have been making a moving monster! Children have looked how objects move using leavers and pivots. They have explored making linkages using card for levers and split pins for pivots. Following on from this_they have designed and made their own moving monster.









Year 3

In Maths, the children were able to describe turns including clockwise and anti-clockwise. They could recognise a 90-degree angle as a right angle and compare, measure and draw a range of angles. We also learnt how to recognise 2D and 3D shapes as well as parallel and perpendicular lines. When learning about statistics, children learnt how to interpret and draw pictograms and bar charts. They enjoyed collecting their own data and presenting this in different ways as well as learning how to read and interpret 2-way tables.

In English, the children really enjoyed our learning about the poetry book 'Apes to Zebra' and created some fantastic poems based on the examples in the book. They began to understand the messages behind the shape poems and how the shape impacts the message to the reader. They created their own shape poems about snails and bees. We also based our writing around a short animation called 'Contre Temps' (Against Time) and the children learnt about different grammatical features including conjunctions, fronted adverbials and direct and indirect speech. They concluded this by writing the next chapter to the story.

Within our Clarborough Curriculum, it has been so interesting to compare where we live to Zambia. We began by looking at Zambia's human and physical features before locating the village of Mugaremeno. Children compared the River Zambezi to local rivers and couldn't believe they washed their clothes in the river and had to make fences to stop crocodiles getting them! Children learnt about the 'Big 5' and wrote their own fact files about these animals. Our successful bake sale allowed us to have an 'African Day', where we spent the day with Bemma learning a range of African dances, stories, songs and finished the day creating our own African Art.










In Art, the children learnt about 3D structures and manipulated a range of materials to create their own 3D structures. They also learnt how to use hot and cold colours when painting, to create different moods. In French they learnt how to order their own ice creams including which flavours they would like and how many scoops! We completed this by asking for a real ice cream. They also learnt how to name a range of 2D shapes in French. In PE, children learnt the skills needed to play tennis as well as rounders.

In Science, Year 3 focussed on scientific enquiry and conducted a range of experiments, learning how to write their own predictions, method, results and conclusion as well as posing their own scientific questions.














The Year 3 Bake Off was a huge success! We were inundated with cakes and sweet treat donations. We had so many cakes we ended up running the sale over 2 days!!


We manged to raise an amazing £264.50!! Thank you so much to everyone who donated.

Year 4

This half-term in Maths, pupils have been learning about angles and shapes. They learned to identify angles as a measurement of turn before identifying different types of angles: acute, right-angle and obtuse. Pupils then learned about different types of 2D shapes: triangles, quadrilaterals and polygons. We managed to use our knowledge of etymology to support us to recognise that the prefix quad- means four (like a quad bike) and so a quadrilateral has four sides. Pupils enjoyed making different quadrilaterals, such as a rectangle, square, rhombus, trapezium and parallelogram using art straws. Finally, pupils learned how to identify symmetry in shapes and pictures.



In English this half term, pupils have been writing some amazing shape poems, inspired by the text, *From Apes to Zebras*. Pupils also watched a short animation called *Reverso* and wrote diary entries from the perspective of the main character, Barney.



Our Clarborough Curriculum focus this half-term continued the theme of Vikings, learning about how Vikings traded goods before moving on to exploring trade nowadays. Pupils learned the meaning of the words import and export, how goods are traded between countries before exploring Fair Trade.

In Science, Year 4 learned about living things and their habitats, learning how to: recognise that living things can be grouped in a variety of ways; explore and use classification keys to help group; identify and name a variety of living things in the local and wider environment.

In Art, they have been refining the skills that have been learned this year.

In Computing, they have enjoyed re-exploring previous learned units such as: eBook Creation, Data Handling, Minecraft and Interland.

In French, the pupils have been learning the names of familiar vegetables and how to ask for an amount of vegetables.

Miss Mayhew and Mrs Pressley would like to express how much we have enjoyed Year 4 this year. Your children are amazing and we feel fortunate to be taking them into Year 5. Have an amazing summer and see you in September.

Year 5

This term in Maths, we have continued to focus on the four operations. It has been great to see the children's confidence grow as they have become more familiar with the methods that we have practised. More recently, we have been learning about time. The children have compared both analogue and digital clocks. Over the last couple of weeks, we have revisited money. The children have been able to apply their prior knowledge to reasoning and problem-solving questions.



In English at the start of the term, we looked at a poem called 'The Otter' and discussed the metaphors, imagery and rhyme that has been created in the shape poem. The children then created their own shape poems for an animal of their choice. More recently, we have used the video 'The Alchemists letter' to discuss pathetic fallacy, metaphors and emotive language. The children have then written letters from the point of view of the characters and created a narrative about changes in the narrator's perspective.

Within Clarborough Curriculum this term, Year 5 have been developing their field work skills. We looked at Clarborough on an international, national, regional and local scale. After that, we discussed the needs of the people that live in Clarborough and what facilities are available. During our visit around the village, the children gathered evidence for how Clarborough meets the needs of the people that live there. Since then, Year 5 have analysed and reported on their findings.









In Science, Year 5 have been learning about changes of materials. We investigated both reversable and irreversible changes. In addition, Year 5 explored the effect of different liquids of the rusting of metal.

Within Art, we have used a variety of medias to create self-portraits. The children then designed and created a self-portrait using their favourite methods.

Within Computing we have been programming using Minecraft education and in French we have been learning to present ourselves. The children are able to converse about how they are, their name and their age

Year 6 Leavers and Leavers Activities

In Maths, the children have been learning about financial literacy including how to budget using profit and loss accounts as well as the meaning of risks and investments. They have used their skills to cost ingredients for their 'Year 6 Bake off'.













In English, they wrote their final narrative pieces based on the Literacy Shed film *Alma*. The narratives they produced were phenomenal and really showcased how hard they have worked throughout this year.

Furthermore, they wrote shape poems based on the book *Apes to Zebras*. They chose their favourite animal, analysed their behaviours and features and then using their poetry knowledge created wonderful animal shaped poems.










In Clarborough Curriculum, the children have learnt about the Anglo Saxons, Scots and Vikings. They explored the difference between invaders and settlers and learnt about the countries of origin and how they used invasion tactics to take over different tribes.

In Science, they explored the theory of evolution by Charles Darwin. They learnt about inheritance and how different species adapt to their environments. In Design Technology they have been learning about microbits as well as creating props for their end of year production.

In French, they have been playing lots of games which have helped them learn the name of different clothing pieces.

The church kindly donated The Gospel of Mark from the international Children's Bible, to each child for them to take away. Thank you to Reverend Mark and the Church for their hospitality.










Year 6 Leavers Performance – 'School of Pop'
