### **Contact Tracing**

Please take a few minutes to read through the below information regarding COVID guidelines we are asking you to follow as we break up for the Half Term.

If a pupil or staff member tests positive for Coronavirus, having developed symptoms within being in school, then please office at office@clarborough.notts.sch.uk and we will assist in identifying close contacts and advising self-isolation in line with guidance from Public Health England and the DfE, as the individual may have been infectious whilst in school

So, if you or child develops symptoms on Friday 28th May, Saturday 29th May or Sunday 30th May and you receive a positive result for COVID-19, please contact the office and we will identify close contacts and then advise self-isolation. This is because you would be within the 48hours infectious period.

If a pupil or staff member tests positive for Coronavirus, having developed symptoms more than 48hours since being in school, the school does not need to be contacted.

So, if you or your child develops symptoms after Sunday 30th May and you have a test carried out and it is confirmed positive, you do not need to inform school. This is because this is beyond the 48hours infectious period. Parents and carers would need to follow the contact tracing instructions provided by NHS Test and Trace and isolating guidance.

We're making a fresh call for all eligible adults in Nottinghamshire to get vaccinated against Covid-

We want everyone to have the protection offered by the vaccine to reduce the spread of the virus and to help Nottinghamshire's continued unlocking of Covid-19 restrictions.

The more people who take up the offer of a vaccine, the greater the protection afforded to all local communities and our schools. Like you, we want to move towards 21 June when all remaining social restrictions might be lifted by the Government. We don't want to return to lockdown.

Currently, everyone over the age of 30 can get the vaccine - to book your appointment, visit www.nhs.uk/covidvaccine or call 119. We want everyone to have the vaccine

We understand that there may be valid reasons for people to be a little unsure or hesitant about having the jab. If you haven't yet taken up the opportunity to be vaccinated, you haven't missed your opportunity; anyone can change their mind. The NHS currently has a good supply of the

People might also be concerned about the Covid-19 variant that originated in India. Latest research shows the vaccine is still effective against this variant.

If you have questions, the local NHS has a webpage with lots of frequently asked questions and links to information in other languages, videos and other sources of information.

It is important families continue to follow national guidance and when not showing any symptoms conduct twice weekly testing using free, rapid COVID tests. This identifies those unseen cases that can still spread the infection. The children have finished their huge sunflower picture inspired by Vincent Van Gogh – Amazing!




### Year 1 - Space

### Year 1 Bubble Group (Seoul)



In Seoul class this week, the children have been working really hard to complete some assessments - well done Year 1 for working super hard!

We have also been finishing our wonderful space stories. We have had all sorts of animals going up to space in different rockets and the children have designed rockets exploding or crashing on to different planets. Luckily, all our characters in each story got back to Earth safely in the end!

The children have also enjoyed making rockets this week. They have used lots of old containers and boxes and found different ways of fixing them together to create their own designs. I know they really enjoyed this activity.

Our fabulous space display is now up in the hall. The children have used their planet and rocket designs to add to our display and we are all super proud of it!

### **Year 2 Bubble Group (Wellington)**



Maths

In Maths this week, the children have found a third of an amount and used their knowledge of fractions to shade shapes as well as identify how much of a shape is shaded. We looked at equivalent fractions and now understand that two quarters is the same as one half as well as many other examples. The children used greater than and less than symbols to compare fractions, noticing that although the denominator may be greater, the fraction is

smaller. For example, 1/2 is greater than 1/3. After half term, we will revisit addition and subtraction as well as multiplication and division.

#### English

This week the children have been authors and taken part in our 'BIG WRITE' sessions to create their own stories based on 'The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch'. They have thought of some very imaginative ideas! They created their own front covers to accompany their story and are very proud of the outcome. We are going to make the stories into a class book and hope to share these with other classes in the future.

#### Topic

As our topic 'Beside the seaside' comes to an end, we revisited all the learning we have done over the last few weeks and summarised this. The children looked back at the questions that they thought of before we started, and we found the answers to any outstanding ones such as how many seaside towns there are in the UK and why the sea goes in and out!

After half term, our topic will be 'Invention of the World Wide Web' and will begin with the text 'When Charlie McButton Lost Power' by Suzanne Collins. A detailed breakdown of learning will be sent out after the half term break.

A huge thank you for all your support this half term and I hope you all have lovely break!

Spellings and weekly homework will be set each Wednesday.

### Year 3 Bubble Group (Zagreb)

This week Zagreb class have worked incredibly hard on writing their Victorian stories. They came up with their own criteria and most children managed to make sure they included what was asked of them.

In Maths, we have started our topic of money. We have made a shop and the children have taken it in turns to become the shop keeper; counting money and working out how much change they needed to give.





In Clarborough Curriculum this week, the children learnt all about Dr Barnardo's incredible work and how this still helps people today.

Over the half term it would be great if you could find time to listen to your child read at home. Everyone has been working really hard in their daily VIPERS and guided reading sessions and after the half term they will be taking their Star Reader quiz again on Accelerated Reader to hopefully see an increase in their ZPD.

It would also be really beneficial if you could show your child some of our currency/money. Although we are focusing on this in school at the moment, some children do not recognise our coins and so cannot find an amount i.e. can you make 15p? (use a 10p and a 5p not a 15p coin). Also, after the half term we will be moving on and looking at time. In particular, recapping o'clock, half past, quarter past and quarter to and then moving on to the Year 3 objectives of finding time to the nearest 5 minutes. The children love it when they ask "how long until playtime?" and I respond with "playtime is at 10:45" and they then count how long is left themselves. This is a great way to promote their time knowledge and independence too!


### Year 4 Bubble Group (Riga)






We have continued to focus on 'time' during Maths and started to apply knowledge of time to different reasoning and problem-solving questions. It would be great if over the holidays you continue to ask your child what the time is and use simple worded questions such as; If dinner is ready in 45 minutes, what time will it be? These questions will really help them to strengthen their understanding.

In English, the children have continued their missing chapter piece of work, and I am proud to say they have all produced such amazing work! The children have taken their time to also produce some lovely artwork relating to their chapter - Well done Year 4!










The children have learned some fabulous French this week - looking at their family members and being able to identify when we use 'Mon, Ma or Mes'. The children even had a go at recording themselves on Seesaw - please take a look! They were trying their best to use the correct pronunciation and answer questions about how they are feeling, their age, where they live and if they have any brothers or sisters.

In Topic, we have finished 'Pilgrim Fathers' and created some brilliant facts on what it was like for the Pilgrims when they arrived in America and understanding the impact they had on America. They also looked at the important role William Bradford had to play on the voyage to America.



After half term the children will be starting their new topic 'Amazing Americas'. They will be learning about North and South America in more detail. In English, they will begin their new genre of persuasive writing. We will be looking at powerful speeches and how travel and tourism use persuasive devices to encourage people to travel.

Year 4 also enjoyed some maggoty ship biscuits baked by Ruby – delicious!


### **Year 5 Bubble Group (Caracas)**



This week, the children in Caracas Class have been busy showcasing their learning from this half term all about ancient Egypt. They have been working hard on their own self-chosen projects and have been very creative in their choices. We have had: PowerPoints, artwork, a play, a song and a card game to name a few. 




In Maths, we have learned about tenths as a fraction and solved some tricky reasoning questions and problems in this area.

In English, they have been consolidating their SPAG skills in the areas of parenthesis, commas, adverbials and relative pronouns. The children have also enjoyed testing their knowledge of these SPAG skills by completing the quizzes on Spelling Shed.





After half-term, our new topic is called 'Raging Rivers' and children will be learning about why rivers are so important to the towns and villages that have developed on their banks. By looking at the features of rivers, and the natural and human ways that rivers change over time, children will explore the life stories of rivers. Children will learn the names and locations of the major rivers of the UK and the world. In the first week back, they will be locating the key rivers in the UK.

In Science, we will be learning about properties and changes in materials and this will begin with comparing materials.

In English, they will use the text 'River Story' to explore the use of adjectives and noun-phrases in description before writing their own river poems.

In Maths, the children will continue to look at fractions and decimal equivalents.

Our French Unit will look at irregular verbs.

Our Computing Unit will explore data handling; creating graphs and pie charts to present data in different ways.

A few weeks ago, Class 5 pupils helped Miss Mayhew and Mrs Beswarick rescue an injured hedgehog from the playground.

The hedgehog was passed to Sue from Seventh Heaven Hedgehog Rescue who took care of the female until she was well.

Happily, on Thursday, the hedgehog was brought back to us and released.

### Year 6 Bubble Group (Havana)



In English this week, the children have been working on writing their persuasive application letters to Beowulf asking to be his new sidekick. We have had lots of different skills on offer from being a trainee magician, superb personal chef, being the fastest in all the land to being so strong they once beat Thor in an arm-wrestling match!

In Maths, the children have been exploring the world of shape and space. We have been using the practical resources to explore the properties of 3D shape and the polygon shapes to make nets with Mrs Cowell-Clark.

The children have spent their afternoon sessions this week making and decorating their Viking helmets. Each child designed their own unique helmet and then constructed it using Mudrock. We also looked at how stereotypes can change our perception of history and people.





After half term, we are going to begin writing a detailed non-chronological report based on discovering different types of dragons.

In Maths, we are going to start looking at converting between fractions, decimals and percentages as well as calculating a percentage of an amount.

In Topic, we are going to use the computers to find out about Viking home life and we will try to discover if they were the horrendous, bloodthirsty warriors, we all think they were or if there is a different side to their history.

In Science, we will be looking at the evolution of species across the globe as well as the process of childbirth.

Amongst all of this, we will also find the time to play some games, sing some songs, solve puzzles, riddles and conundrums!

# This information is taken from the daily update received from the Department for Education:

#### Asymptomatic testing information for parents and adults in households with children at school or college

NHS Test and Trace announced that all adults in households with school and college age children without symptoms can now access regular rapid coronavirus (COVID-19) testing.

Test kits can either be collected or ordered online, as set out below. Schools should not give test kits to parents, carers or household members and should not order more test kits for this purpose. Secondary school and college students will continue to access testing through their school or college.

Please share the information below with your parent networks to help answer any questions they may have. Undertaking regular, rapid coronavirus (COVID-19) testing helps reduce transmission of the virus. Parents and other adults in households with children at school or college, who do not have symptoms, can now access regular, rapid coronavirus (COVID-19) testing. This includes childcare and support bubbles.

Tests are fast, easy and completely free. There are <u>different ways</u> for a household, childcare or support bubble to collect their test to take at home, twice-weekly:

- through your employer, if they offer testing to employees
- by collecting a home test kit from a local test site anyone aged 18 or over can collect 2 packs of 7 tests
- by ordering a home test kit online please do not order online if you can access testing through other routes, this frees up home delivery for those who need it most
