Booking in Breakfast Club and Wraparound Club



Reception

It's been another busy half-term in the Adventurers class and we have been very proud of the children for lots of reasons, but especially for their performance in our Christmas Show!

Our topic has been 'Books we Love', and we have enjoyed listening to lots of fantastic stories, beginning with 'Stone Soup'. We re-told the story using actions to help us and developed our fine motor skills by using child-safe knives to chop up vegetables; we even picked some of the herbs that grow in school to add to our 'soup'. We have read different versions of fairy tales, such as The Magic Porridge Pot and Little Red Riding Hood and have looked at the parts of the story that are always the same and those that can be different. When we read The Gingerbread Man we talked about speech bubbles and what they are used for, and then retold the story using small world toys.

As there have been lots of festivals and events during this half-term we have been learning about them too. We began by talking about Bonfire Night and then the children made poppies for Remembrance Day and learnt why it is celebrated every year. We read the story of The Nativity to understand why Christmas is important to Christians, as well as talking about the ways people celebrate Christmas by decorating their homes, eating special food and giving each other presents.



In Maths, we have been learning to recognise 2D shapes and their properties, and have been identifying shapes in our environment. The children have also been finding 1 more and 1 less than a given number and been making numbers from 1 to 5 in different ways. In the last week of term, we have been practising

selecting the correct size of paper to wrap presents of different shapes and sizes. We finished the term with a fun-filled Elf Day, where we got up to lots of rascally things, and had a great time at our party.

We would like to wish you and the children a very Happy Christmas and look forward to seeing you all in 2026!







Year 1

In Maths this half term, Year 1 continued learning about addition and subtraction and were introduced to the part-whole model and enjoyed finding a part. The children have been looking at the addition and equals symbols and learning to write number sentences as well as subtraction and fact families. Children also learned to recognise a range of 3D shapes and find patterns within 2D and 3D shapes.

In English this term, we have read the following texts: 'The book of names'

'Snowball'

'Hurry Santa'

'Jack Frost'

'Nativity story'





Activities around these texts focused on writing simple sentences including beginning with a capital letter, leaving spaces between words and using a full stop. We also learnt that we need to use capital letters for names.

In our Clarborough Curriculum this term, our topic was 'The Gunpowder Plot'. We have completed our learning by finding out about the early life of Guy Fawkes, how he came to be a part of the Gunpowder plot, and how Bonfire night is celebrated today.

In French, the children have been learning how to say 'hi' and 'hello' with Mrs Gulsever. They have also learnt how to say 'my name is...' and ask somebody in French how they are feeling and give them a reply. They then began learning a range of colours and numbers up to 12.

Our Science topic this half term has covered 'Seasonal changes'. The children have enjoyed listening to the 'Four seasons of the Year' song and can name all the months that fall into each season. The children have learnt to observe changes across the four seasons and describe the weather.

In Art we focused on drawing - Make your mark. Children used different line types and mark-making techniques in drawing, described different lines, used control drawing materials like pencils and chalk, and experimented with various media, while responding to music.

Year 2

In Maths this half term, we have been learning addition and subtraction. We have used what we have learnt during our place value unit to support us in adding and subtracting single digit numbers and then moving on to 2-digit numbers. We have also been adding 3-single digit numbers by using what we know about our number bonds to 10.

In English, we have been looking at another short video clip, this time called 'snack attack'. The clip was about two characters, a lady and a man. It showed the lady at first trying to buy biscuits from a vending machine, she then went and sat on the platform of the train station and proceeded to eat the cookies. The man, who was sat next to her, took one of her cookies and she got mad. Eventually the lady, who was very angry at the man for stealing her cookies, got on the train. As she went to get her ticket out of her bag she realised that her cookies were actually in the bag all along. The video rewound and we realised the lady had put her cookies in her bag and the cookies she ate were actually the mans. Following on from the video we have completed lots of activities linked to the story and learnt about expanded noun phrases, conjunctions,

past and present tense. We have discussed the story form the different characters perspectives and used this to write short paragraphs.

The children have also written Christmas shape poems. They have learnt about alliteration and adjectives and tried to use these in their poems.

In Geography we have been learning about hot and cold places. We have identified where the equator is and how this affects the temperature on earth. The children then located hot and cold places on a world map. We then described the features of hot and cold places thinking about the weather, animals, plants and physical features. Finally, the children learnt how animals adapt to living in hot and cold counties and considered what they would pack if they visited one of these countries.

Our Science topic has been looking at materials this half term. The children have identified and compared the suitability of a variety of everyday materials. They have also learnt that the shape of solid objects made from some materials can be changed by squashing, bending, twisting and stretching.

The children have learnt to count to ten in French. They have also learnt ten common colour names. We always enjoy our French lessons and the children now have Language Angel passwords in their planners. If they would like to sing any of the songs we have learnt at





home or have a go at some games to practise their French, please have go at logging on together.

In Computing, we have been learning about digital art and how to complete art work on a screen. We discussed how sometimes this works better as it can be less messy and you don't need to have all the equipment and tools you would need to paint a picture on paper. Also, if you make a mistake, you can rub it out and start again which you can't do when using paintbrushes. The children have enjoyed creating pictures in the style of Mondrian, using a grid and then the fill tool to add bits of colour to their picture. We have also learnt how to create shapes and use this to make pictures.

Next Term:

In Clarborough Curriculum we will be finding out about different explorers from the past as well as more recent explorers including Neil Armstrong.

In Maths we are moving on to multiplication and division and how to complete these number sentences. In English we will be looking at another film unit called 'The Bridge' and learning about fables, writing our own fable and another unit around amazing animals.

Our Science topic will be covering 'animals including humans.' The children will learn to notice that animals, including humans, have offspring which grow into adults. The children will be learning the names of seven sea creatures in French.

Year 3

In Maths this half term we have continued to develop our understanding of addition and subtraction. Our strong Place Value knowledge helped us when calculating answers as well as using mathematical resources and diagrams. We learnt how to use the column method for adding and subtracting numbers with up to 3 digits. We then moved on to multiplication and division, where we learnt what multiplying and dividing means. We have been learning the 3- and 4- times tables as part of this work which has really supported our times tables recall. We have recently started a weekly Times Tables Challenge. There are 60 questions and,

when someone gets 60, they move up to the next challenge level. Year 3 are doing incredibly well on this so far!



In English we started this half term writing our explanation text about Magnetism. We looked at example texts, identifying the key features of them. We were then able to write our own texts explaining how magnets work.

Following this, we looked at the film clip 'Ride of Passage'. We spent time identifying the sequence of events, developing our understanding of the story. We developed our knowledge of pronouns, conjunctions and clauses as well as learning how to punctuate speech accurately.

In History, we finished our learning on the Stone Age to Iron Age. We were even set a challenge from our recent visiting elf to recreate Stonehenge using custard cream biscuits which was great fun and definitely challenging!

We have started our Geography work looking at Food and Farming. We were curious about what information is provided on food packaging and have looked in more detail





about how food is grown and produced around the world. We recently looked at Fair Trade and how it benefits farmers and their communities.



Our Science work this half term has been on Rocks. We have learned about different types of rocks and their properties. We have also been learning about weathering and fossils.

In Art our focus has been developing our drawing skills. We have practised shading and creating different effects with pencils. We then worked on our observational skills, paying close attention to the details of what we were sketching.

In French we have continued to develop our phonics knowledge. We learn French in a variety of ways and Year 3 especially love the games we play!

Next Term:

Next term in English we will be looking at Tadeo Jones for our narrative work, with a focus on language and descriptive writing. Our non-fiction work will be based on the life cycle of a flowering plant.

In Maths we will be continuing with Multiplication and Division and will then move on to Length and Perimeter. We will continue to really focus on all children being confident recalling their times tables, including division facts, so please do carry on supporting your children learning them at home as well.

Our Science next half term will be based around Plants. In Geography we are focusing on the local area and then a contrasting locality in South Africa. In History we will begin our work on Ancient Egypt. We will be developing our singing techniques in music and doing gymnastics and dance as part of our PE lessons.

In Maths this half term, we have been working on our times tables and developing our knowledge of multiplication and division.

Within English, Year 4 created their own narrative about the Romans using the skills that they have learned. For example, expanded noun phrases, fronted adverbials and the correct punctuation of speech. More recently, we have been creating a set of instructions on how to build a roman road.

This half term, in History, we have been learning about the Romans. The children investigated the expansion of the Roman Empire, the story of Boudica and what life in Britain was like before the Romans. The children thoroughly enjoyed creating Roman shields too.

Within Science, Year 4 have been learning about states of matter. The children investigated the particle structures of solids, liquids and gasses before discussing condensation and evaporation.

In French, the children looked at the phonemes i, in, ique and ille. The children then looked at the phonemes within words and texts.






Next Term:

English: Create a narrative using dialogue, apostrophes and paragraphs. Also, creating an explanation text. Maths: Developing our multiplication and division skills further to include both multiplying and dividing three-digit numbers by one-digit numbers.

Year 5


Maths this half-term has been a real eye-opener as to the importance of knowing and understanding times tables. Pupils have learned about multiples, factors, prime numbers, square numbers and cube numbers. Pupils then moved on to the first block of work on fractions and have successfully applied what they know and have learned to: recognise equivalent fractions, convert improper fractions to mixed numbers and vice versa, compare and order fractions and add and subtract fractions. I am extremely proud of how hard they have worked in Maths!




Our first unit of work in English was based on a short film called 'Little Freak' and followed the story of 'freak shows' from the past. Pupils enjoyed learning about the history of the circus and



how the abolition of 'freak shows' came about. Pupils used the film as a stimulus to make inferences and write some descriptive phrases to describe the character and setting. Following our assessment week, we have spent some time revisiting aspects of grammar and punctuation that are not yet secure and will continue to do so to fill any gaps in knowledge and understanding.



Volcanoes and earthquakes have sparked a real interest and curiosity in many pupils this half-term. They have learned about the structure of the earth, what tectonic plates are and what happens when they meet. They have learned about the key features of a volcano and some famous volcanoes around the world. They have located where some famous earthquakes have



occurred, discussed the human and environmental impact of volcanic

eruptions and earthquakes and decided what might need to be included in an emergency survival kit.

In Science, pupils have learned about the changes that happen as humans develop to old age. They learned to identify the key stages of a mammal's life cycle, about the gestation period of different mammals, about foetal development, conducted an investigation into hand spans in children and adults, learned about the

changes that happen during puberty and how our bodies change as we enter old age. Pupils have discussed themes with maturity and good understanding.

Installation Art had been our topic for this half-term and pupils began by creating a 3D poppy installation for the front of school to commemorate Remembrance Day. They learned about the work of significant installation artists and created their own pieces.



Design was a very popular Computing unit because pupils learned how to design and make their own apps that include: changing slide size and background colour, adding text, images, icons and hyperlinks. They then applied these skills to designing their own apps on a theme of their choice.







In

French, pupils have learned some key French vocabulary linked to Ancient Britain.

Next Term:

The Spring Term theme is Raging Rivers! Pupils will learn about:

- Fractions (continued)
- Non-fiction writing about crime & punishment and a fictional piece
- Rivers
- Crime and punishment (beyond 1066)
- Properties of materials & Forces
- Music Creation & E-Book Creation

Year 6

This term in Maths, Year 6 have been learning all about the four operations, and how using BIDMAS for answering the order of operations is important. The children have learnt how to calculate fractions using multiple different methods. They have learnt how to convert mixed numbers to improper fractions and find common denominators. Furthermore, they have been applying their methods when tackling multi-step problems.

In English this term the children used the stimuli 'Beyond the lines' and 'The Piano' to write an emotive letter and a flashback, both of which were based on WW2.

The children have also written a newspaper report about 'The Grinch who stole Christmas'. They explored character and setting descriptions as well as interviewing different characters using reporting clauses.

In History, the children have learnt all about WW2. They researched: The Blitz, Dunkirk and The Battle of Britain. They have explored the roles of men and women during the war, as well as, the effects it had on children. They learnt about rationing and the types of food and clothing which were rationed. The children have worked incredibly hard throughout this emotive topic and have demonstrated such a mature attitude.

In Science, Year 6 have explored light; they found out that it travels in straight lines and they explored how light is reflected off multiple surfaces. They have carried out numerous experiments to support their learning including: building periscopes, and investigating how shadows are formed. They learnt that shadows can change length depending on how far away the light source is. Finally, they have explored the concept of refraction and investigated how a rainbow is made.
