Bird watch of the week



Great spotted woodpecker

Woodpeckers are mainly black and white with red at the back of their heads and below their tails. They have strengthened tail feathers that help them balance against the tree. Young birds have a red crown and fluffy feathers. They eat insects, seeds and nuts. If you find a small black and white spotty feather in a woodland it is probably from a Woodpecker.

Fact: Woodpeckers can drill through solid wood to make a nest hole or to find tasty insects to eat. They do this by pecking up to 20 times per SECOND. So why don't they get a headache? They have very strong necks and a long tongue that wraps right round inside their head which helps cushion their brain.

Nursery and 30hrs (Frida Kahlo)



Another busy week in Nursery learning about farm animals. Everyone was intrigued to learn about the milking process! We have taken part in various crafts and have learnt how to sign lots of animals in Makaton. I am beyond proud! As we prepare the older members of the class for full time school, we are encouraging them to work more independently at simple tasks and they are coping brilliantly. It's lovely to hear them chatting together.

Next week, we will be learning about the festival of Easter and why it is so important to Christians.





Star of the week: Katrina for her very detailed and descriptive sci-fi story!


Year 6 (Lucian Freud)

After School Club Assistant

We wish to appoint an After School Club Assistant to assist the After School Club Supervisor in the management of wraparound care from April 2022 to July 2022 initially.

It is anticipated that the successful candidate will be offered a NJC Grade 1 salary, although this is currently subject to job evaluation, with the actual rate of pay being confirmed at interview.

The post will require the post holder to work for 8 hrs per week and will be required to work for 39 weeks of the year, (covering term time only).

The club runs from 3:30pm – 5:30pm, Monday to Thursday and is based in the main hall at Clarborough Primary School. Children who attend the club are offered a snack which is prepared by the After School Club Supervisor and Assistant.

The After School Club Assistant will work together with the After School Club Supervisor to ensure the safety, general welfare and proper conduct of pupils during this period, supervising snacks and engaging children in a range of activities which will be based on play and relaxation, not school work.
