This week we have been talking about 'Poppy Day'; why we have it, when it is and why it is important.





We have talked about what a memory is, and as part of this we have read 'The Paper Dolls' by Julia Donaldson; a lovely story about a little girl who adds to her memories as she grows up.

We have also been playing board games as this is a great way for the children to learn about taking turns, playing fairly, learning how to be a good loser and a good winner!

I have been very proud of the way in which many children have continued to play these games with their friends, remembering everything they have learnt about fair play.



Next week, we will be reading 'Spinderella' and learning all about spiders. We will go on a spider hunt around school and learning lots of spider facts!





Year 1 (Joan Miro)



Maths

The children continued their learning of part whole models this week and began to write their own number sentences including the addition symbol and equals sign. They found different ways to make the same number using cubes to help. They then moved on to systematic number bonds, noticing patterns when finding all possible pairs of numbers.



Next week, the children will compare number bonds and 'add more' by counting on.

English

Our English work linked to our Topic work this week. The children sequenced the events of The Gunpowder Plot. They ordered images and wrote their own sentences about what happened. In Rainbow Grammar, they used the text 'Dear Zoo' to understand adjectives as describing words. Next week, the children will begin learning about poetry. They will listen to a range of poems and write their own list poem using their senses.

Topic

The children were so excited to learn about a new historical figure, Guy Fawkes. They found out about The Gunpowder Plot from 1605 and placed these events on a timeline, comparing this to when Florence Nightingale was alive. They learnt about how and why The Gunpowder Plot happened, asking fantastic questions to extend their learning! Next week, the children will learn more about how religion played a part during this time and find out what life was like for Catholics.

Wellbeing Ambassadors



We are excited to appoint two Wellbeing Ambassadors to represent Miro Class. If your child is interested in applying for this role, it would be great if you could support them in completing the application form and returning this to school by Thursday 18th November. They will attend regular meetings with Miss Marshall and aim to improve wellbeing in our class as well as around school.

In our class assembly, the children learnt about Remembrance Day and why we have 2 minutes silence on 11th November. They then created their own poppy to add to a special picture of themselves.



Computing

Our Computing lessons for this half term are about 'e-Safety' and how to stay safe online. Through animated videos, the children learnt why it is important to keep personal information safe and why we do not share this online. Next week, the e-Safety session will focus on where to go for help and support when concerned.




Year 2 (L.S. Lowry)



This week in Year 2 we have been linking our topic of Winston Churchill to Remembrance Day. Once again, the children were so enthusiastic about our topic and have remembered so many facts and events we discussed last week. As a focus this week we have been looking at evacuees, introducing the term to the children and beginning to imagine what it would have been like to have been an evacuee and having to leave our family homes. The children have created some lovely list poems about their thoughts and feelings about home and what home means to them.











In Maths this week we have been looking at addition and adding 2-digit numbers to 1- and 2-digit numbers. We have been trying to encourage the children to show their working out and to keep their learning neat. The children amazed us on Tuesday with this and we are super proud of them! Some children have started to learn how to do column addition too and again have absolutely amazed us in this. Keep up the hard work Year 2!





As it has been Remembrance Day this week, we have spent some time creating our own poppies and talking about the importance of this day. The children have been very respectful during this time and some have enjoyed sharing their stories from home about family who were alive in the war, medals that they have from grandparents and other things. We are looking forward to this continuing during the remainder of our topic, so please keep talking to your children about family members who were alive during the war.

In Science, we have been exploring how some materials and shapes can be changed by twisting, bending, stretching and squashing. The children explored some different objects and investigated if they could be squashed, stretched, twisted and/or bent. Then we recorded what we found out in a table.



Before Christmas, the Year 2 children will be completing the Phonics Screening check. I have spoken to many of you about this and the importance of practising at home with your child. I would like to remind you about the Phonics Play website, which we used during lockdown. There are many free games on here that will help support the children in blending real and alien words as practise for the screening check. Please utilise this resource and the activities on Seesaw to practise, practise, practise with your children at home. If you have any questions please come and ask.

Year 3 (William Morris)



Wow, what a brilliant week of learning! The children have continued with their hard work, and persevered through some tricky work to produce some amazing Maths, writing and experiments. There have been lots of laughs and learning this week!

In Geography, we continued our volcano work for our 'Extreme Earth' topic and we had a cross curricular lesson where we created our own volcanic eruption. The children were brilliant at working in groups to use the correct amount of ingredients to produce their very own volcanic eruption! The children recorded the steps they took, and it was lovely to see their reactions on Seesaw when they saw the chemical reaction take place. Some of the children added even more vinegar after, to see what would happen, and it had the same reaction again. The children recorded in their books the ingredients you would need to do this experiment, the method and a description of what happened when the vinegar was added. It was a great lesson and the children were all very excited!











In RE this week, the children looked at the beliefs in Christianity. They had discussions on what Christians believe and why and then looked at the Ten Commandments. In groups, they then acted out some role play to represent one of the commandments. The rest of the class had to guess which commandment they had chosen. It was great fun and Year 3 showcased some fantastic acting skills!








This week in Maths, the children started their statistic unit. The children were introduced to pictograms and looked at how we can represent data using pictures. We looked at tallies and how these are used to record and understand data quickly. The children then had a go at producing their own pictogram from data collected; represented by the amount of coloured cars that were in a car park.


Year 3 have worked really hard in their English to create a piece of writing linked to our class book 'The Ironman' including adverbs at the front. The children were set the task of improving sentences by adding information before and after to the very simple sentence. The children created very detailed and beautiful pieces of writing.


During Art this week, the children have created their own poppy work. They have looked at images of poppies and images linked to remembrance and from this the children shared their views on what they liked, and then interpreted their own image of poppies in any way they felt appropriate. It was so nice to see the children using their sketch books to their full potential, and each one turned out very different. I'm sure you will agree, they all look great!














Next week, we will continue to look at pictograms and column addition in Maths. In English, the children will continue with their stories.

In Geography, the children will produce arguments for and against living near a volcano and in RE, we look at special places in Christianity. We will continue our work on e-safety in Computing.

Year 4 (Salvador Dali)



In English, the children have been continuing their learning about the verbs 'to be' and 'to have'. They began writing their short narratives based on Hamlet (the elephant from The Firework Maker's Daughter) using the auxiliary verb 'to have to' in the present perfect tense. Next week, they will be writing detailed setting descriptions about the Fire-Fiend's Grotto, using paragraphs to help organise their writing.

In Maths, the children have moved on to column subtraction working with 4-digit numbers. Most children recognised when to exchange using our class rhyme "if there's more on the floor, you need to knock next door!". The children even managed to apply this method to decimal numbers when working with money. This week we have also brought back 'Fraction Friday' for our Friday Math lessons. This is to help the children recap and consolidate their fraction knowledge, eventually we will introduce decimals and percentages too. Next week, they will continue their learning on column subtraction.

I just wanted to take this opportunity to say a big 'thank you' for helping your child to learn their times tables. Every Tuesday, after swimming, the children love trying to beat their previous score using the TTRS paper grids. The children always manage to increase their scores and we have one child who has almost reached 100!

In Science, they have been working scientifically to carry out an experiment about tooth erosion. They prepared their question, learnt all about a prediction and wrote their method. They then looked at conducting a fair test and submerged our eggs in to the different liquids. Next week, they will be analysing the results of the test and writing their conclusions.



In Topic, Year 4 found out about the lines of longitude and latitude and the significance and positions of the Arctic and Antarctic circles. Next week, they will be identifying the position and significance of the Tropics of Cancer and Capricorn.



In Art, they have been looking at the Eiffel Tower (for Europe), who built it and sketching lines. Next week, they will be using clay to sculpt famous landmark models. We have also produced some beautiful 3D remembrance art in support of the Remembrance Day this week.

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In French, the children have enjoyed learning the names of classroom objects and next week they will continue their learning of these.

In ICT, they are creating e-Books.

In RE, they have explored the importance of the Aqiqah ceremony and next week they will be looking at the next part of the Islamic journey by focusing on marriage.

Year 5 (Banksy)



What a diverse and productive week we have had in Banksy Class! Here is a round-up of what has been happening this week and what will be happening next week.

English: This week the children have thoroughly enjoyed planning, designing and drawing their own maps for our class 'Once Upon a Time Map Book'. Their levels of motivation and engagement have been so high.

Next week we aim to complete the written part of our map books including: instructions for navigating the map, points of interest, dangers and the all-important key.



Maths: This week we have been learning about prime, square and cube numbers and have enjoyed putting our multiplication tables to the test trying to work out square and cube numbers. Next week, they will be learning how to multiply by 10, 100 and 1000.

Science: This week, they have been able to recognise the stages of development during childhood, understood the different needs at each stage and written reports about the changes that occur. Next week, they will learn about the changes that occur during puberty and how they differ for boys and girls.

RE: Year 5 were fortunate to have a visit from the Salvation Army this week who talked about the work they do, their uniform and band as well as finding out what the children had learned last half-term. Next week, they will be learning about the Dalai Lama and his beliefs.









French: This week I was incredibly impressed with their ability to say the French words for different habitats such as the Saharan desert, the Pacific Ocean and the tropical rainforests. They were also able to listen to and translate some full sentences from French to English. Next week, they will learn to say the names of some plants that live in the various habitats.

DT: This week, the children made and represented different types of circuit and next week they will design and communicate their ideas for a light.



Art: The children produced some amazing collages in Art this week based around Remembrance Day.

Computing: This week, the children worked really well to change slide size and colour as well as adding text and images so we are ahead of ourselves! Next week, they will add icons and further text.

PE: This week, the children learned how to perform handstands and cartwheels safely and we will continue with this next week.

Year 6 (Lucian Freud)

This week in class, we have been combining our learning about all things WW2 related with remembrance. In English, we have started looking at remembrance poetry and have been studying some of the more famous poems from WWI. We looked at each poem line by line and the children and I analysed what each part actually meant and represented. We discussed how a 'sea of green' was the gas that would roll across the battlefield and how looking through 'misty panes at the green light' was the soldier talking about wearing his gas mask. To finish this week's writing, we looked at using personification and similes in our poems to add detail and effect.

In Maths this week, we have been working on our multiplication skills. Starting with short division, the pupils then quickly moved onto long multiplication and then multiplication word problems with Mrs Cowell-Clark.

In Topic, we studied and researched the leaders of specific countries during WW2. In the lesson, we focused on those leaders who were considered to be dictators. We studied the leaders of Spain, Russia, Italy, Japan and Germany. Researching the leaders, the children had to find out their political views, how they took power, what their ultimate goal was and what they did immediately upon taking power.

In Science, we studied the human eye in order to understand how we see. This was the first lesson in our new Science topic of light. We looked at how light moves and how the different structures of the eye allow us to see different colours and distances.

In IT this week, the children became budding graphic designers. We looked at some famous App logos that the children will have seen every day on their phones or tablets and we looked at the process of creating our own versions of the calculator, weather and photo app logos.

In PE, the children continued to develop their handball skills in their sessions with Ben. They worked on their ball handling, and their dribbling skills. In the PE sessions with me, we continued to work on our gymnastic skills. We developed our jumping and landing skills that we began last week, and this week we moved on to understanding how to safely roll forwards, backwards and sideways.

In Art this week, the children created inverse poppy art. Instead of creating artwork with soldier silhouettes, the children created silhouettes from different sized tissue poppies.
